Excerpts from the ordinance: "No person shall within the corporate limits of the Village of Deerfield, sell, offer for sale, give away, have in his or her possession, or discharge any cannon, torpedo, rocket, mine, bomb, fireworks or other explosives, or set off any squibbs, crackers, dynamite caps, dynamite tablets or anything containing powder or other explosive material, without permission from the Board of Trustees or written permission from the president, which permission shall limit the time of such firing, and shall be subject to being revoked by the president at any time after it has

been granted. "Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than two dollars and not more than two hundred dollars for each of-




