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Deerfield Bans Fireworks, Plans Safe and Sane Fourth

The sale of fireworks is prohibited in Deerfield by an ordinance passed July 13, 1937, which provides a fine from \$2 to \$200 for violation. A safe and sane Fourth is the objective of many North Shore communities and Deerfield joins those ranks this year for the first time.

Hundreds of persons are injured or blinded each year by fireworks. The use of pyrotechnics should be under skilled direction, such as public displays, but not placed in the hands of children, who are apt to lose hands, eyes or even their lives.

Excerpts from the ordinance: "No person shall within the corporate limits of the Village of Deerfield, sell, offer for sale, give away, have in his or her possession, or discharge any cannon, torpedo, rocket, mine, bomb, fireworks or other explosives, or set off any squibs, crackers, dynamite caps, dynamite tablets or anything containing powder or other explosive material, without permission from the Board of Trustees or written permission from the president, which permission shall limit the time of such firing, and shall be subject to being revoked by the president at any time after it has been granted.

"Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than two dollars and not more than two hundred dollars for each offense.

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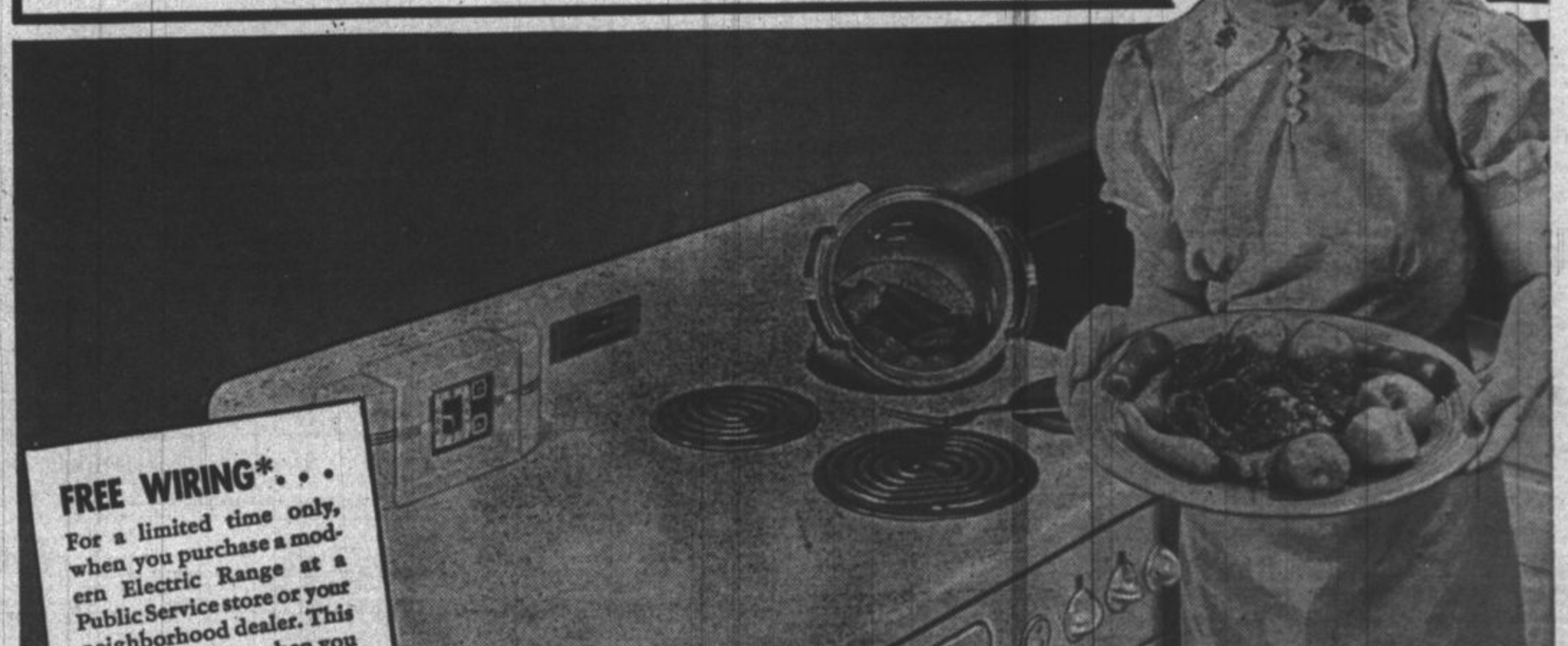
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
