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Local Man Wins "1938 Prize Parade" for Sales Activity

Bert Mastri, 47 S. St. Johns, Highland Park, in recognition of his sales activity in the national merchandising project known as the "1938 Prize Parade," has been granted an award by the Association of Gas Appliance and Equipment Manufacturers, sponsors of the campaign promoting the sales of automatic gas water heaters.
