Parishioners Honor Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok in Deerfield Church

A service will be held on Sunday evening in St. Paul's church, Deerfield, in honor of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the ordination of the Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok in the ministry, sponsored by the pastors of the Arlington Heights district of Evangelical churches with Rev. Armin Bizer of the Northbrook Evangelical Neighborhood church, president of the district, presiding.

Rev. Piepenbrok was ordained on July 27, 1913 in the Evangelical church at Port Arthur, Texas, by his father the late Rev. F. W. Pie-

penbrok, who was pastor of that church. His first parish included four churches: Santa Claus, Clay City, Chrisney and Centerville, in southern Indiana. He lived at Clay City.

After three years, he received a call to Marthasville, Mo., and he served that community for six years. Returning to school at Albion, Mich., he served a church in that city for two years while working for his AB degree at Albion college. In September of 1925 Rev. Piepenbrok accepted a call to St. Paul's church in Deerfield and has served this congregation faithfully since that date. During his pastorate in Deerfield, he received his B.D. degree at Northwestern university. Rev. Piepenbrok is a graduate of Elmhurst college at Elmhurst, Ill., and Eden seminary in St. Louis, Mo.

It is of particular interest that two of his brothers are also ministers. Rev. Paul Piepenbrok is at Jackson, Mo., and Rev. Ernst Piepenbrok, at Indianapolis, Ind. There are also two other brothers not in the ministry: John, the eldest, in Milwaukee, and Martin, the youngest, in Detroit.

A congregational dinner by members of St. John's church of Highland Park and St. Paul's church in Deerfield, was held on July 27 (last evening) on the anniversary of Rev. Piepenbrok's ordination, at the Deerfield church.

C.M.T.C. Reaches Halfway Mark at Fort Sheridan

The colorful athletic program of the C.M.T.C., Fort Sheridan, has reached its halfway mark under the direction of the Regimental Athletic Officer, Captain F. A. Sauer, 403rd Infantry. The most closely fought contests are softball with the Reds, Company H (6 wins and no losses) and the Blues, Company F (5 wins and 1 loss) equally matched and the other 12 teams crowding the leaders. During the same period an elimination Singles and Doubles Tennis Tournament will take place to determine the camp champions. A track meet will be held July 29 and 30. Individual prizes and team trophies will be awarded the various winners. The C.M.T.C. candidates at Fort Sheridan came from Illinois and Wisconsin.
