The Carl E. Olsons and a group of friends from Chicago picnicked at the Forest Preserve near Northbrook on Sunday.

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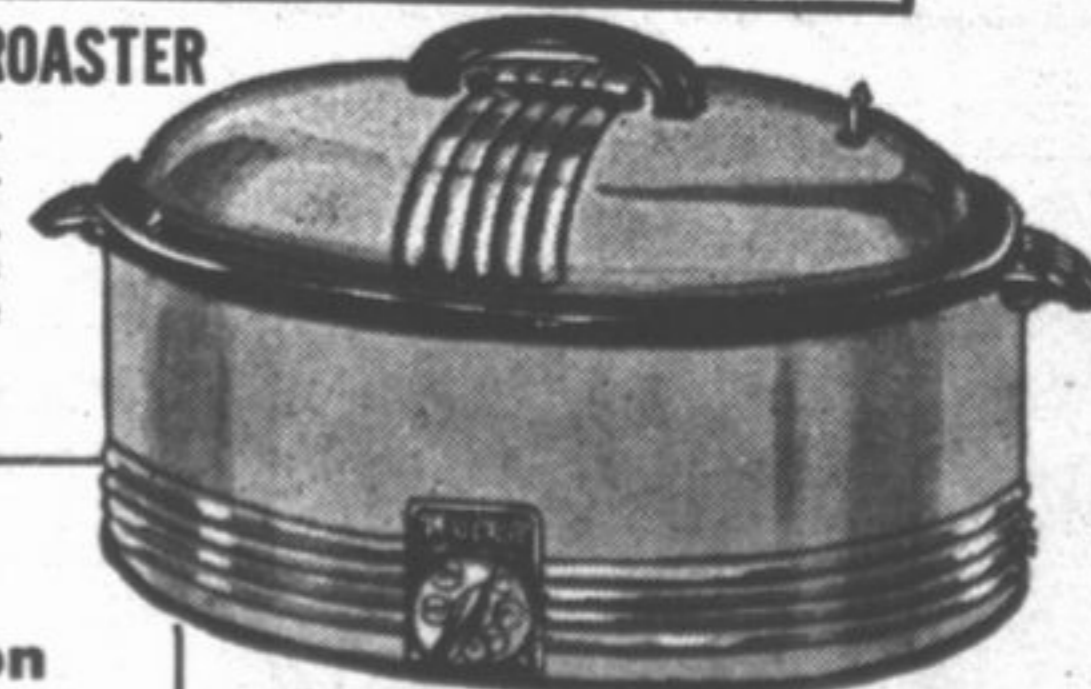
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
