MENU

*Braised Lamb Chops
Small Potatoes, Jersey Style
Onions Melton
Molded Fruit Salad
Date Souffle*

BRAISED LAMB CHOPS
6 lamb chops 1/2 cup celery
1 lbs. flour 1/2 cup onion
3 lbs. drippings 1 tsp. salt
1 cup carrots 1/2 tsp. pepper
1 cup turnips 1 cup water
Dredge chops with flour. Put drippings in frying pan and brown chops on both sides. Mix finely cut vegetables; add salt and pepper and turn into baking dish. Arrange chops on vegetables; add boiling water and cover closely. Bake in moderately slow oven (325 degrees) 1 1/2 hours.

SMALL POTATOES, JERSEY STYLE
12 small potatoes 1 tsp. paprika
1 1/2 tsp. salt 8 lbs. parsley
1/2 cup white pepper 4 lbs. butter
Cover pared, even sized potatoes with boiling water and cook 25 minutes or until tender. Drain, place in serving dish and season with salt, pepper, paprika, minced parsley and melted butter.

ONIONS MELTON
6 even-sized onions 2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup grated cheese 2 lbs. butter
1/4 cup toasted bread 1 cup thin white crumbs
Drop onions into boiling water

and cook gently uncovered 40 minutes. Drain, place in baking pan. Stir cheese into crumbs with salt and sprinkle over onions; dot with butter, pour over white sauce and bake in moderately slow oven (325 degrees) 35 minutes.

MOLDED FRUIT SALAD
1 pkg. lime 1 cup grated pineapple
1 cup gelatine 1 cup apple and juice
1 cup boiling water 1/2 cup nut meats
1 cup orange 1 head lettuce

Dissolve gelatine in boiling water and set aside until thick like molasses. Fold in diced orange, grated pineapple and juice, and chopped nuts. Set aside to become firm. Serve on lettuce nests with Mayonnaise or boiled dressing.

DATE SOUFFLE

4 egg whites 1 tbs. walnuts
1 tsp. baking powder 1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup sugar 1 cup dates
1 cup dates 3 tbs. walnuts
1 tsp. vanilla
Beat egg whites until frothy; add baking powder and beat until stiff and creamy. Fold in sugar, finely chopped dates and nuts; add vanilla. Turn into buttered casserole; set in pan of hot water and bake in moderately slow oven (325 degrees) 1 hour. Serve with whipped cream.
