OFFICIAL PUBLICATION

Pursuant to law in such case made and provided, public notice is hereby given that the following Joint Resolution of the Sixtieth General Assembly, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Illinois, which proposed amendment will be submitted to the electors of the State of Illinois for adoption or rejection at the General Election to be held on November 8, 1938.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14.
RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 60th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring therein, That there shall be submitted to the electors of this State for adoption or rejection at the next Election of Members of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, in the manner provided by law, a proposition to amend sections 5, 6, 7 and 8 of Article XI of the Constitution so that said sections shall read as follows:

Section 5. No state bank shall hereafter be created, nor shall the state own or be liable for any stock in any corporation or joint stock company or association for banking purposes, now created, or to be hereafter created.
Section 6. No act of the General Assembly authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, whether of deposit or discount, nor amendments thereto, shall go into effect or in any manner be in force unless the same shall receive the affirmative votes of not less than two-thirds of the elected members of each House of the General Assembly.
Section 7. No act of the General Assembly shall hereafter be enacted authorizing or permitting any banking corporation or association to issue money or bills to circulate as money.
Section 8. All provisions of the law of this state making stockholders of banks personally liable for obligations of the bank are hereby repealed and declared null and void and no obligation created thereunder shall be enforced unless suit for such purpose be pending within one year after this amendment becomes effective.

The form in which the proposed amendment to the Constitution of Illinois is to appear upon the official ballot at the General Election on November 8, 1938, is as follows:
EXPLANATION OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT.
1. Proposed section 5, like present section 5, provides that the State shall not be interested in any bank.
2. The amendment omits the provision from present section 5 requiring submission to the voters of acts of the General Assembly relative to banking. It provides in proposed section 6 that acts of the General Assembly relative to banking shall not go into effect unless such acts receive the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the elected members of each House of the General Assembly.
3. Proposed section 8 repeals the provision of present section 6 making stockholders of a State bank liable to the creditors of the bank over the amount of stock held by such stockholders for liabilities of the bank.
4. Proposed section 7 provides that no bank shall hereafter be permitted to issue money or bills to circulate as money and replaces present sections 7 and 8 regulating the issuance of money by banks.

The aim of the school is to provide the homeless girl with a background of care and home life, to give her a school home that merits her pride and loyalty and to prepare her with adequate training so that she may eventually become independent.

It is a worthy cause, and the committee urges the support of Highland Park women. The price for the series will be very nominal.
