### **Andrew Peterson** Victim of Stroke Funeral, Tuesday

Andrew Peterson, aged 64, 63 Vine avenue, suffered a stroke, Saturday evening, while returning to his home from a drive to Deerfield, with his wife, and died a short time later at his home.
