New books on the shelves in the children's room for grades 5 - 8.

**Averill**—Voyages of Jacques Cartier. The story of the three journeys of Jacques Cartier based on his log books, told in a readable way and attractively illustrated.

**Bailey**—Tops and whistles. Interesting and historically correct are these stories of American toys.

**Benz**—Pasteur, knight of the laboratory. A well presented biography of the famous French scientist.

**Crownfield**—Strong hearts and bold. Virginia in the early times of struggle for freedom and liberty, and the story of a young girl who took an active part in it.

**Darby**—Peace pipes at portage. On a historically correct background is told this fast moving story of Jean Baptiste, the foster-son of Governor William Clark of the Missouri territory.

**Harkness**—The baby giant panda. The story of Brookfield Zoo's beloved Su Lin, her capture in China and her journey to the United States. Profusely illustrated.

**Haycraft**—The boys' book of great detective stories. Good collection of stories by well known authors.

**Leyson**—American wings. Wings of war, of navy and army, wings of commerce, of mercy and sport, wings of distance and in the stratosphere, wings of the past, wings in the future—in short modern aviation for everyone.

**Mac Veigh**—Greek journey. A pleasant and informative account of a trip through modern Greece interspersed with stories from folklore and history.

**Parton**—Your Washington. A new guide book to the nation's capital.

**Tolkien**—The Hobbit. A story of little Mr. Bilbo Baggins who loved his hobbit-hole and yet ventured out to fight the dwarfs. A story of trolls of goblins and all kinds of adventures.

**Van Stockum**—Cottage of Bantry Bay. A delightful Irish tale of pleasant home life and everyday happenings, a touch of mystery and a bit of adventure.

**Zolotovskiy**—Deep sea divers. A simple account of the training of the Russian deep sea diving school at Kronstadt plus author's thrilling experiences while working for the Soviet government.

### For Grades 1 - 5

**Bemelmans**—Castle No. 9. A story full of nonsense and humor, a model butler and the confusion resulting from renaming things in the castle.

**Brock**—High in the mountain. A pleasant little story from Switzerland for the fifth and fourth grades.

**Daugherty**—Andy and the lion. A modern version of Androcleus and the lion. Full page drawings full of irresistible humor.

## "Ducks Unlimited" to Restore Breeding Ground of Wildfowl

Twenty years ago duck hunting was an important sport in Illinois. Each season, the influx of duck hunters contributed materially to many stores, restaurants and hotels in the state.

Since that time the decline in number of wildfowl has become so pronounced that some authorities have prophesied the total extinction of the sport in another five years—unless something can be done about it.

Fortunately, something is being done about it, and that something deserves the support of every sportsman. Ducks Unlimited, a non-profit organization now active in forty states, has begun to restore and improve the Canadian breeding grounds of wildfowl. Since eighty-five per cent of the United States supply of wild ducks is hatched in Canada, that location will give Illinois hunters the most ducks per dollar. In one instance, a simple dam costing less than \$300 restored

water to 8,000 acres, and saved countless nesting sites.

Ducks Unlimited has for its Illinois state chairman Louis H. Barkhausen, retired business man and the owner of a 2,000 acre hunting preserve on the Sangamon River. Its field work is directed by the executive secretary, Harrison Kennicott, one time Illinois state trap-shooting champion. Both men serve Ducks Unlimited without pay, as do all other officers of the organization throughout the country. Every dollar raised is spent on actual work in Canada.

The work of Ducks Unlimited is a heartening evidence of the wholesome international situation existing between the United States and Canada. Compared with the armed suspicion so characteristic of Europe and Asia today, our relations with Canada are an oddly harmonious note in the discordant symphony of present day world diplomacy. The co-operation of the Canadian government, the free use of government land, the free assistance of Canadian citizens with the Ducks Unlimited program—all these are fitting tokens of a friendship symbolized by thousands of miles of inter-

national frontier, unguarded through its length by any fortress worthy of serious military consideration.

This will be ignored by most people, because it is so commonplace. The important point which will remain in the minds of Illinois duck hunters is: Ducks Unlimited can increase the Illinois duck supply, with the help of Canada, and the support of our own hunters.

## Lake Bluff Gets Five New Houses

Five new Lake Bluff dwellings of colonial design will be ready for occupancy around October 1, E. T. Harlan, realtor and builder, announced today.

Two of the five residences—all are in the \$9,000 to \$10,000 class—have already been sold. Four of the five homes were financed by the Federal Housing administration. Three of the houses are in Briar lane, one in Woodland road and the fifth in Witchwood lane.

It is the first time in ten years, according to Harlan, that a group home building program has been undertaken in Lake Bluff.

Purchasers of the two new houses—both sold for \$9,500—are A. J. Martin and Edward Burkell.
