Exmoor Swimmers Win Second Place in All C. C. Meet

In the meet held at Oak Park Country club, Sunday, September 4, Exmoor's swimmers gave an excellent account of themselves by winning 2nd place among the numerous clubs competing. First place was won by Hinsdale Country club who scored 256 points in 44 events against Exmoor's 211 points. Third place was won by La Grange with 102 points, Oak Park getting 4th place with 82 points and the other clubs trailing close behind.

The two outstanding stars of the meet were Patricia Moore and Margaret Johnston. Patricia competing in the 13 and 14 year old division was the high point winner for the entire meet scoring 19 points by winning firsts in the 50-yd. crawl, the 25-yd. breast stroke and the fancy diving and getting 5th place in the 25-yd. back stroke. She was also a member of the winning relay team. Margaret in the 15 and 16 year old class was 2nd to Patricia as high point winner with a total of 18 points with first places in the 50-yd. free style, the 50-yd. breast-stroke and the 25-yd. backstroke. She established new meet records in each event as did Patricia Moore in her events.

Bob Redfearn was high point winner in the boy's division scoring 15 points by winning the 25-yd. crawl, the 25-yd. backstroke and getting 3rd place in the fancy diving. Bob also was a member of the winning relay team. In the 25-yd. backstroke for girls 11 and 12 years of age, Peggy Knight and Nancy Newey were 1st and 2nd.

In the boys 17 and 18 years Exmoor scored an upset by winning 1st and 2nd place in the 100-yd. swim. Bill Peters was 1st and Bob Jackson 2nd. Bill was just nosed out of 1st place in the 50-yd. breast-stroke with Bob Jackson coming in 3rd. Jerry Bowes also lost 1st place in the 50-yd. backstroke by an eyelash.

Elizabeth Newman easily won the swim across the pool for girls 5 and 6 years of age, and sister Nancy won three 2nd places, in the crawl, the backstroke and the fancy diving to score 12 points for Exmoor. In the fancy diving for girls 10 years and under Nancy Toel won a close decision over Nancy Newman in a very beautiful series of dives. Sister Susan Toel won 3rd place in the girl's diving in the 11 to 14 year old class which was won by Patricia Moore. Joan Kemper was touched out in the 50-yd. breaststroke for girls and also scored a 3rd in the 50-yd. crawl and 4th in the backstroke for a total of 8 points. Martin Detmer scored 5 points and swam on the winning relay team.

Exmoor swimmers won 1st place in 3 relay races winning the boys 10 and under by about 30 feet over

the nearest team. Members of this team were Mansfield Cleary, Dick Henry, Martin Detmer and Bob Redfearn. The members of the winning team for girls 10 and under were Nancy Sproul, Peggy White, Nancy Knight, and Nancy Newman. The winning medley relay team for girls 11 to 14 years was composed of Peggy Knight and Nancy Newey in the crawl, Nancy Hawxhurst in the backstroke and Patricia Moore in the breaststroke.

The Exmoor boy's medley relay team of Frank Strattan and John Finner in the crawl, Bill Peters in the breaststroke and Jerry Bowes in the backstroke came in a very close second.

The medley relay for girls 15 to 18 years saw Exmoor's team of Elaine Wood and Peggy White in the crawl, Joan Kemper in the breast-stroke and Margaret Johnston in the

backstroke fight its way to 3rd place. Third place was also won by Exmoor's medley team for boys from 11 to 14 years composed of Dave Aubrey and Bill Strattan in the crawl, and George Bard and Channon Bowes in the breast and backstroke.
