Mrs. L. C. Gatewood to Organize Red Cross First Aid Classes

Mrs. Lee C. Gatewood, 286 Laurel avenue, co-chairman of the health services committee of the Highland Park Red Cross, is organizing courses in Red Cross first aid and in home hygiene and care of the sick for residents of Highland Park.

All persons interested in taking either or both courses are requested to report at the Y.W.C.A. building, Monday afternoon, Oct. 3. The meeting of those interested in home hygiene is scheduled for 1:30 o'clock and the first aid group is to meet at 3:45 o'clock.

Classes will meet successive Monday afternoons for the duration of the courses.

First aid instruction is designed to teach lay persons how to render first aid in case of accident. The training includes treatment of fractures, cuts, sprains, convulsions, poisoning, shock, wounds, asphyxiation and other common afflictions.

Home hygiene instruction includes training in homemaking, personal and household hygiene, health preservation, care of the sick and aged in the home, improvisation of sick room equipment, methods of meeting common household emergencies, and nutrition.

Red Cross certificates are awarded to all successfully completing the courses.
