Raymond M. Calkins Deerfield Resident Is Taken By Death

Raymond Mott Calkins, president since 1933 of the Steelco company, a steel construction concern, died Sunday in his home in Bannockburn. He was 52 years old and a son of Ransom M. Calkins, former president of the Milwaukee railroad, who died in 1932.

Early in his business career, in 1908, Mr. Calkins became a partner in the Hammond-Dodson company, St. Paul, Minn., dealers in western ranches. From 1916 to 1919 he was American representative of the commonwealth government of Australia and the commonwealth government steamship line, and was engaged in shipbuilding in Seattle, Wash. For the next nine years he was president of the Northwest Gypsum Products company, Lewistown, Mont. He returned to Chicago in 1928, and since had been associated with investment houses.

He was a member of Sigma Phi fraternity, the Union League, and Episcopal clubs, Chicago, and the Knollwood Country club, Lake Forest. Surviving are his widow, Kathleen, and two daughters, Miss Eleanor Jane Calkins and Miss Kathleen Bradley Calkins. Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Tuesday in the chapel at Rosehill cemetery.
