Offer Proposal To End Long Strike On N. S. Line Oct. 1st

the North Shore Line, has offered a plan for ending the strike on the railroad and restoring service at 1 a. m. October 1.

A letter has been mailed to all operating employees of the line, enclosing a card to be signed, expressing his approval or disapproval of the plan involved.

The main proposal offered by Col Sprague was that the men should return to work at the time set and that the company would pay them as much as possible from the immediate revenues of operation, pending the completion of negotiations now in progress toward a new contract.


It was understood that in the event of the signing of a new contract the wages agreed upon in such contract probably would be made retroactive, although no definite promise to this effect was made.

If the Sprague plan is accepted, it is understood working conditions at the time of resumption will be the same as before the strike, which began August 15. All strikers, as far as operation permitted, would be reinstated. Meanwhile, negotiations for a contract would con-


