Lewis stressed the importance of temporary as well as regularly employed persons to be sure and furnish their social security numbers to their employers, to enable the employers to complete tax forms prop-

Every employer of one or more who is engaged in commerce or industry is required by the Social Security Act to pay taxes under the old-age insurance plan. This tax consists of one per cent of the covtred wages of workers and a contribution of a like amount from the

wages of those who are employed. When a person buys out or takes over the business of another, the new owner must have his own socurity identification number and is not permitted to continue to use the old number. Contributions and taxes under this plan, for the current quarter, are due not later than the last day of October and are


