Ex-Sheriff Ahlstrom Passes on Thursday

Edwin A. Ahlstrom, 45 years old, chief of the Johns-Manville police force, passed away at the U.S. Veterans' hospital at Hines, early last (Thursday) morning.

The deceased had held the posi-Waukegan, and served Lake county as sheriff from 1922 to 1926. He was born in Waukegan, May 10, 1893, and had always made his home in that city. During his earlier years he was engaged in the electrical business, but gave that up when he entered the political field.
