1939 Cadillac-LaSalle Cars Now On Display

Ample proof that streamline styling does not mean poor vision was brought to the attention of upper North Shore motor car enthusiasts by the introduction of the 1939 line of Cadillacs and LaSalle's, staged this week by Harry H. Drew, Jr., manager of the Cadillac Motor Car Division Branch at Highland Park.

The new series of Cadillac and LaSalle cars show marked improvements toward comfort, safety, appearance and flexibility of controls. The LaSalle is built with high-crowned fenders and flowing lines.

The radiator is considerably narrower than was last year's models, whereas the Cadillacs have a three-sectioned radiator grill, with the exception of the "16."

"Five body styles are presented by LaSalle," pointed out Mr. Drew, "while the Cadillac '61' has four body styles. Convertible coupes will this year have folding seats enclosed in the tonneau instead of the conventional rumble seat. Running boards are optional on all models.

Cadillac and LaSalle are soundly built automobiles, and the precision manufacturing standards that have long made them famous are seen as high spots of the 1939 models.

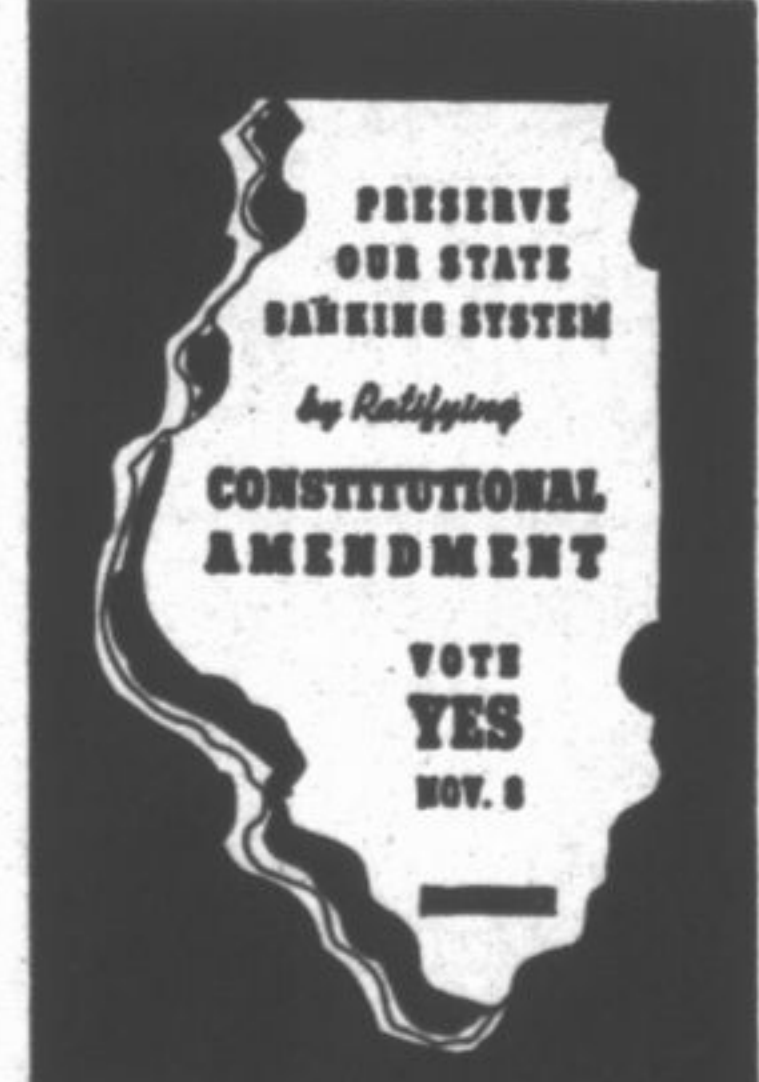
