The Highland Park Public Library can supply you with information, designs and colors on costumes, toys and dolls for parties or holidays. You will find their history interesting, their construction simple and their information usable.

A selected group of books is listed here:

Folk Costume Book—F. H. Haire—Includes the costume which is most characteristic of each country, with emphasis on general affects and richness of color.

Historic Costumes—a chronicle of fashion in Western Europe, by F. Kelly. A practical guide to the fashionable civil modes of three centuries. The subject is presented extensively by contemporary paintings and prints.

Historic Costumes in America—E. McClellan—from 1607-1870. A book complete for the student, artist, author or layman.

Peasant Costumes in Europe—K. Mann—Typical examples of peasant costumes are presented in color and line drawings.

Costumes Throughout the Ages—M. Evans—Containing a most complete bibliography of history of costume.

History of Costume—C. Kohler—A book in which the author has shown by practical examples the history of the development of dress from peoples of antiquity through the 19th century.

Costume Book for Parties and Plays—J. Leeming—A book of national folk costumes, historic costumes and special costumes. The text is clear, mentioning the colors to be used, and the black and white drawings illustrate the costumes.

Costume Design and Illustration

—E. Traphagen—A book for methods, design, fashion silhouettes, period fabric design historic costume and a bibliography for students.

Dolls and Puppets—M. Boehm—A comprehensive work which gives us the history of the doll from prehistoric Troy to the modern marionette theatre.

Children's Toys of Yesterday—G. Holme—Dolls of all countries are represented and contains an interesting chapter on dolls connected with famous people.

Dolls—E. Singleton—A book which shows that through the centuries the doll has been of more importance as a fashion model than a plaything.

Dolls to Make For Fun and Profit—E. F. Ackley—Clear directions and patterns for making all kinds of dolls.

Peeps at the World's Dolls—H. W. Canning-Wright—Contains colored illustrations and a story of each country's dolls.

Dolls the World Over—E. Hooper—The story of her large personal collection of dolls.

A Doll's Family Album—E. K. King.

Dolls, an Anthology—J. A. Robinson—Delightful poetry, all about dolls.

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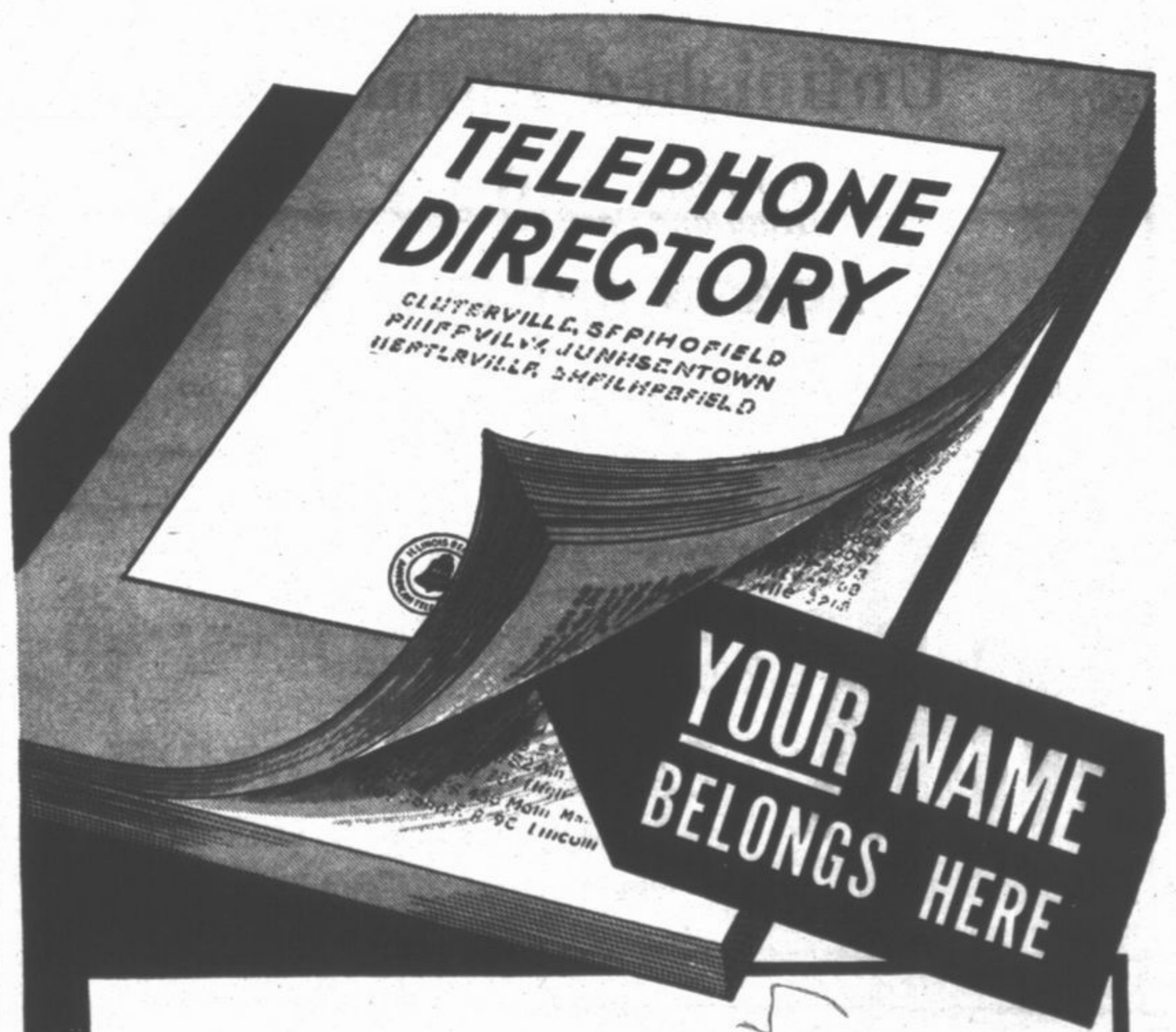
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
