Doris Kenyon, star of the films in the days of silent motion pictures, was married in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, New York, Friday to Albert D. Lasker, Lake Forest business man. Only members of the immediate families were present. The ceremony was performed by Irwin Untermyer, supreme court justice. The bride was known not only as an actress but as poet, author and concert singer. Her former husband, Milton Sills, was a star of the silent movies and a one-time professor of philosophy at the University of Chicago. Lasker's first wife, Flora Warner, died in 1936. Together they had created the Lasker Foundation for Medical Research at the University of Chicago. Lasker formerly was chairman of the U. S. Shipping board, and an important stockholder of Lord and Thomas, advertising firm. He recently announced his retirement from active management of the concern.
