The United States Civil Service
 Commission has announced open
 competitive examinations for the
 positions named below.
 Teacher in Indian Community
 and Boarding Schools, Indian Field
 Service (including Alaska), Depart-
 ment of the Interior. This examina-
 tion is announced for filling posi-
 tions in various optional branches,
 with salaries ranging from \$1,620
 to \$2,000. A college education and
 certain experience are required. Ap-
 plicants must not have passed their
 fortieth birthday.

Agricultural Extension Agent,
 \$2,900 a year, Assistant Agricul-
 tural Extension Agent, \$2,600 a year,
 Indian Field Service, Department
 of the Interior. Certain college
 training and experience are re-
 quired for these positions. Applica-
