Elm Place School Sponsors Efficient School Safety Patrol

For the past few years the Elm Place school has cooperated with the Chicago Motor club in sponsoring the School Safety patrol. This year we have the largest and perhaps the most efficient patrol. Twenty-seven eighth grade boys volunteered to serve as patrolmen and have been assigned to serve at the five important street intersections near the school.

The patrol is divided into two squads of twelve patrolmen each. Each squad is in the charge of a lieutenant who reports to the captain or patrol supervisor the conduct of the members of his squad. By having the two squads any one patrolman is on duty only every week.

The primary purpose of the patrol is to prevent children from being killed or injured by automobiles while on the way to and from school. The patrolmen are on duty at their assigned corner from 8:30 to 8:55 each morning; from 12 to 12:10 and from 1 to 1:25 each noon intermission; and from 3:30 to 3:40 after school. This means that these

boys forfeit about 1 1/2 hours of their play each day to help their fellow school mates make the trip between home and school safely. At the same time, however, they are developing certain qualities of leadership and good citizenship which are intangible rewards for their services.

Last spring the American Legion recognizing the importance of the safety patrols in Highland Park, purchased a number of raincoats for the patrolmen while on duty on rainy days. This year the Parent-Teacher association of the Elm Place school has given the patrol an additional quantity of coats so that each member of a squad will be protected by a raincoat and hat while on duty. The patrol is very grateful to these organizations for their cooperation. What we need now is the cooperation of every parent and child in our district. Let us each and every one do our part in helping these boys make a success of their great undertaking.
