George T. Rogers President Of High School Board Speaks

George T. Rogers delivered an address before Highland Park Rotary on "Liberty under our form of Government" on Monday, November 14, as the guest of the superintendent of the high school, R. L. Sandwick. His host commented on their long intimate personal friendship and that the

speaker was a member of the celebrated law firm of Tenney, Harding, Sherman & Rogers, of which the two senior members were dead. He also noted that Mr. Rogers was president of the Deerfield-Shielda High school board for 16 years and that was one of his few appearances in public. In reply to the gracious introduction, the speaker modestly acknowledged their long period of collaboration and rejoiced that they both were lifelong Democrats.

Mr. Rogers gave a careful and clear talk, showing the difference between the monarchy, a democracy and anarchy. He noted that England was not a democracy although people often spoke of it as such, because England has a king. In further explanation of this point, he called attention to the difference between an absolute monarchy and a limited monarchy, because in an absolute monarchy the ruler's word is law. "This is not what we have in the United States," he said.

Going back to early times he noted that all the English people sprang from Germans and Jutes. They were conquered in 1066 and had been striving ever since to throw off their Norman conquerors. This has been done to a certain extent today, but England is far from being free. "In striving to get liberty various customs and rights have developed," he said. The speaker aptly pointed out how this occurred. He said people by custom turned their carriages to the right side of the road when passing and when automobiles came along, laws were enacted to make it compulsory to turn to the right side of the road. Now this has become so well established that we arrest the man who does not drive on the right side of the road. The speaker paused at this point to draw a dramatic picture of what would happen if a dictator suddenly took charge and compelled all the people in the United States to turn right or left at his whim. This was

pointed out as being a great danger and hardship. The speaker likewise read the definition of "Liberty." He took it from Webster's unabridged dictionary. And he also read several other definitions on political subjects and showed how the thing we spoke about as liberty really dif-

fered from the dictionary definition. The speaker apologized for not having time to prepare his speech, but announced that the above were random ideas and remarks which he jotted down. When he completed the address, he received a ripple of applause.
