

Deerfield Sup't Will Be Speaker on Conference Program

The North Shore branch of the Progressive Education association will conduct an elementary education conference, using the theme: "Inter-relation of the School and the Community," on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 18 and 19, 1938. The Friday afternoon session will be held in Northwestern university, the Friday evening session in the National College of Education, and the final session, Saturday morning, in Northwestern university, Evanston.

Among the many interesting subjects for panel discussion groups on Friday afternoon is: "Human Relations in the Fields of Government" — "We Present Our Problems." Dr. A. R. Hatton, Political Science Dept., Northwestern, is chairman of this group, and his co-workers include Ralph E. Church, Representative in Congress, Tenth District; George R. Young, village manager, Glencoe, Ill.; Dr. M. H. Bickham, Works Progress Adm., State of Illinois; Mrs. Bernice VanderVries, Member of Illinois General Assembly; Andrew Maguire, chief, Police Dept., Wilmette, Ill.; and Lester B. Ball, Sup't District 109, Deerfield.

The Saturday morning subject for this panel discussion group will be "Implications for Education." Lester B. Ball will serve as chairman, assisted by Gar Rott, director of publications, Council of State Governments; Miss Agnes Lilley, Winnetka Public schools; R. H. Price, Sup't Highland Park; Poe Street, Lemont high school, Lemont, Ill.; and Ray J. Cox, District 109, Deerfield.

Several Deerfieldians will attend one or more of these conference sessions. The Friday afternoon session is scheduled for 3:30 o'clock; an informal dinner in the First Methodist church, Evanston, at 6 o'clock; and the evening session at 8:00. The Saturday morning groups will convene at 9 o'clock.

Bethany Y. P. to Hear Dr. Lundstrom

Clark Kuebler to Address Sisterhood Monday, November 21

"Buy Ways of Peace" is the provocative title Clark G. Kuebler of Northwestern university has given the talk he will make before the North Shore Congregation Israel Sisterhood on Monday, Nov. 21 at 2 p.m. at the temple. Great thought is always given to the peace program, which marks the November meeting of the Sisterhood, and this year Mr. Kuebler comes as the timely speaker.

Mr. Kuebler is a remarkable intellect, who has achieved a reputation not only in his chosen field of classics, but also in the sphere of economics. He studied in Germany and has returned there every summer, so that he is able to observe the growth and development of Fascism in a manner that few people have the opportunity to do.

A profound understanding of human motivations provides Mr. Kuebler with a liberal point of view. He has always been an ardent pacifist and believes that professors (such as himself) should live in as close contact as possible with their students, in order that the students may discuss and crystallize mature attitudes.

Mr. Kuebler has gained a reputation as a scintillating lecturer throughout the north shore, Chicago and the Middle West. Listening to him, one gets a fresh approach to an age-old problem, and appreciates that approach because it is rooted in sincerity.

The Sisterhood has invited a number of neighboring religious and civic organizations to this open meeting. It extends a cordial invitation to all in the community who are interested in this vital subject. In addition there will be a display of the works of Mr. Saul Raskin in the lounge. These comprise both character studies and landscapes, and Mr. Raskin will be present to comment on his exhibit.

Before the program, there will be a short business meeting at 1:30. Preceding that, Rabbi Shulman will lead a discussion of current events, so drastically significant today. It is suggested that members and guests bring a box luncheon at 12:15.
