HERE are the new 1939 Ford V-8 cars. Above, the deluxe Fordor sedan, below the Ford V-8 Tudor sedan. The two cars are individually styled. The deluxe car has wholly new streamlines, a deep hood un-

broken by louvres, a low radiator grille in bright metal and wide spaced headlamps. The Ford V-8 has a full grille and unobtrusive louvres at the rear of the hood. The deluxe cars are powered with the 85 horsepower engine, the Ford V-8 with the 60 or 66 horsepower engine. Both cars have hydraulic brakes. Bodies are all-steel. The deluxe cars are available in five body types, the Ford V-8 in three, with color option.

Oriental Reopens With Bartholomew On Stage All Week

One of the most important events of the fall theatrical season is now taking place—the reopening of the Oriental theatre, Chicago under new management, with a new stage, film, and price policy, and with one of Hollywood's biggest stars on the stage the first week.

The Oriental, one of the finest theatres in Chicago, with a capacity of 3,500 seats, reopened under the management of Jones, Linick and Schaefer (Friday, Nov. 18) with the world's lowest prices for a deluxe picture palace.

Heading the stage show the first week is none other than Freddie Bartholomew, star of such pictures as "Captain's Courageous," "Lord Jeff," and many others. His appearance at the Oriental is the first time he has ever appeared on the stage in Chicago. He comes to this city during a brief vacation from film making in the nation's cinema capital.

The schedule of prices will be the lowest in Chicago for a deluxe theatre featuring smash vaudeville and Hollywood big names. Prices will range from twenty five cents to forty cents on week days except Saturdays. Saturdays the prices will go to fifty five cents after 6:30 p.m. and on Sundays the top price will be fifty five cents after 5 p.m.

Dark for many months, the opening of the Oriental under new management will be a gala event of real Hollywood proportion. Doors on the first day will open at 10 a.m.

The Girl Scout organization is only one of the many organizations requiring the volunteer service of the busy women in this community. The Highland Park Girl Scout organization is conscious of this, and is bending every effort to lighten the tasks and make the work of the Girl Scout leader more interesting, more efficient, and therefore more satisfying.

The Girl Scout Leaders' association, meets once a month (or often if necessary for the best interests of troops and leaders) and is a medium of exchange of ideas and problems and planning.

In addition to this, the "Consultant Plan" has recently been put into effect. Mrs. John F. Brent, chairman of program is in charge. The "Consultant Plan" is a plan whereby the leaders of the Girl Scout troops have on file, a list of organizations and people in the community willing to give help and instruction in any of the Ten Fields of Interest offered in the Girl Scout program. This means that together, the Girl Scout leaders, Girl Scout consultants, and the Girl Scouts themselves, can actually plan, develop and achieve a definite program or badge requirements in a given time. It is going to provide, ultimately, that with a faithful leader, an adequate place for meeting, and the genuine interest of the Girl Scout, herself, Girl scouting will have a better planned character - building, citizenship, and health-building program, than was ever before possible.
