North Shore Scouts Anticipate Big Gain in Membership

Elect Miss Griswold President Chicago French Teacher's

At the annual fall meeting of the Chicago Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of French, which was held recently at the Palmer house in Chicago, Miss Emma Griswold, head of the department of modern languages, and dean of girls at the Highland Park high school was elected president. She succeeded Professor A. G. Bovee, of University high school of Chicago.

Other officers of the association, which is two years old and includes all teachers of French in the Chicago district, are Miss Geller of the Oak Park high school, vice-president, and Miss Marie Dolese of Chicago public schools, secretary, who formerly taught at Highland Park high school.

The national convention of this association, which is affiliated with the National Modern Language Teachers association, will be held at the Hotel Commodore in New York during Christmas vacation. Miss Griswold will probably attend. The association is devoted to interests, mutual helpfulness, discussion of methods and proceedings and general problems of French teachings.

The duties of Miss Griswold, who was nominated from the floor by Miss Ruth Maxwell, head of French department of Oak Park high school, will be to keep in touch with the national organization, keep the group active and interested, and to prepare a good program for the spring meeting.

One of the matters discussed was the possibility of an inter-school evening of entertainment by the students in French classes and clubs.

Miss Griswold's term of office is two years. The Chicago chapter has the hearty support, sympathy and cooperation of M. Rene Weiller, French consul general in Chicago.
