> Thus far in 1938 upwards of 350 emergency cases have been treated at the Highland Park hospital. In addition, 1,414' men, women, and children have comprised the admitted cases.

H. Earl Hoover, Glencoe, vice president of the Highland Park Hospital Foundation, recently pointed out that of the admitted cases 788 were not residents of Highland Park. "The use of the hospital is most general," he 'observed. "Just how general can best be illustrated by the geographical records maintained by Miss Marjorie Ibsen, the hospital superintendent. For instance, during the last fiscal year, patients from 59 communities were hospitalized here. There were 626 from Highland Park; 188 from Highwood; 141 from Glencoe; 139 from Deerfield, and 57 from Chicago. From Winnetka and Hubbards Woods came 48 patients, and 30 each from Lake Forest and Northbrook, Wheeling ranks next with 15 and Prairie View 13. 11 patients came from Wilmette, 10 from Kenilworth. Evanston and Waukegan and Lake Bluff each provided 8 patients while 6 cases, each, were from Arlington Heights, Glenview, and Oak Park, while from Morton Grove, Niles Center, Des Plaines, and Libertyville came 4 each. New York City, Green Bay and Milwaukee, Wisconsin provided two patients each, while Phoenix, Arizona, Scarsdale, New York, Pittsburgh Pennsylvania, and Shaker Heights, Ohio, are other cities from which patients have been admitted this year.
