### Braeside Group and Safety Commission Survey R. R. Hazard

In a further effort to bring about greater school safety a special group from the Braeside Civic Assn. met with Chief of Police Edw. Moroney and members of the Highland Park Citizens Safety committee to investigate and study conditions at County Line road in order that children living west of the railroad tracks may have greater protection.

William J. Babcock, James McClellan, John Bellows and Herbert Bowker constituted a special committee from the Braeside Assn. who met with Edw. Gilroy chairman of the Citizens Safety committee and H. B. Aiston.

The group explained the dangerous condition existing accounted for by the fact that all of the children on the west side attending Braeside school live north of County Line road and the fact that there is no east and west street between the County Line road and Roger Williams avenue to the north.

They further explained that under this condition there is a natural and very marked tendency on the part of the children to climb up and cross the tracks in an effort to shorten the distance they have to walk.

As a result of the conference with Chief Moroney and this group the Safety committee has arranged a further conference with Mr. E. L. Henry, director of Safety of the Chicago Northwestern railway and who has already indicated his concern and desire to cooperate in any manner possible.

## Girl Scout News

Among the "Who's Who" in Highland Park is Mrs. Raymond Watts, teacher, author and lecturer in Nature Study. Mrs. Watt's lectures are not only instructive but are gems of rare beauty, and have been given many times locally and elsewhere.

A resident of Braeside district, Mrs. Watts has two daughters in troop 3, whose leader is Mrs. Edward A. Harrington. Mrs. Harrington has three splendid sons and a lovely daughter and knows the wishes and needs of youth, and that scouting and out-of-doors are synonymous.

Last year, as her contribution to scouting, Mrs. Watts gave to the Braeside troop a series of lessons in Nature Study. The course proved that study can be made inviting to Girl Scouts even after a day in school, if the study is well planned, well given, and especially if it includes hikes thru the woods and songs and stories of birds, trees and flowers.

When plans were being made for troop activities this fall, the Highland Park Girl Scout Council and the Leaders felt that this opportunity should be given to every Girl Scout in Highland Park. So this course was given on Saturday mornings in October to Highland Park Girl Scouts and their mothers, to troop committee members, council and leaders. It was so well attended and so enthusiastically received, and so necessary to badge work in girl scouting, that it should be included in each year's program so that new workers and girl scouts may have the course.

The first meeting was held at the YWCA. The class made leaf prints, learned to read the age of trees in twigs and in cross-sections, learned something of the life of a tree, and in general, prepared for the actual "field work."

The second meeting was in Turnbull Woods. Special study was made of evergreens because specimens of these were available in this preserve.

The third meeting was held along the Desplaines river near Dam No. 1. This preserve offered splendid specimen trees, enabling the students to recognize tree shapes and characteristic branching.

For the fourth meeting, the class went on a hike in the Deer Grove Forest Preserve near Palatine. On this hike they followed the little creek up the ravine and then circled the lake, and the girls were given their test on recognition of 25 different species. Afterwards they cooked lunch over the fires built by Mrs. Roy O. Nereim and Mrs. Julius Laegler.

The fifth and last meeting was held in Turnbull Woods. After a discussion of pruning, the uses of various woods, and the burning over of forests, the girls hiked through the woods. During the

walk they were examined on their ability to recognize ten trees without leaves.

"Mrs. Watts makes us work, but she makes us feel that the trees are our friends,"... quotation from one of the girls in the class.

A teacher's comment on a report of the girl scouts: "... has done exceptionally fine work in the Nature Study class this period. Her outside work has helped her."
