Opera as Civic Affair Needs More Public Support

After continuous increases in attendance for three years and a large advance sale of seats in 1938, support of the opera has sharply fallen off in previous years is being added to. The needed 10 per cent increase in sale of seats has not materialized.

The public is enjoying opera second to none at prices less than one-half of those paid this year in New York and San Francisco by many of our visiting patrons. Numbered among these visitors are residents of fifteen different states, including Los Angeles, Denver, New York and many cities less distant, who have come here solely to attend the opera. The press proclaims all-time highs in quality and brilliance of productions.

The opera was organized as a non-profit institution for the benefit of the general public. It is being operated on a total budget which is a mere fraction of the annual losses that were sustained prior to 1931. opera has no subsidies and no source of income other than the people for whom it was organized and for whom the management is acting. The management believes Chicago does not wish to be without an opera, but holds itself subject to the verdict of the public.

The Chicago City Opera Foundation is receiving contributions from those who wish the opera to continue and are willing to contribute to that end. Amounts of one dollar and up are being received and the names of all contributors (without amounts contributed) are published. Contributions so far received range from one dollar to one hundred dollars each.

Full realization of the opera as a civic affair of which Chicago may continue to be proud, resulting in broad support in small amounts by a large number, is much to be desired as furnishing the proper and only appropriate scheme for its maintenance by the general public. The additional financial support, which is needed and is requisite to the future of the opera, represents only the slightest of effort if a sufficient number cooperate in furnishing it.
