San Francisco Man Gives Lecture on Christian Science

"Health, abundance, and security are within the reach of every industrious man and woman," declared Peter V. Ross, C. S. B., of San Francisco, in a lecture on Christian Science given last Friday in Deerfield at the Deerfield school auditorium.

Mr. Ross, a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, spoke here under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Highland Park, Ill. Referring to God as Life, and to man as an exhibit of divine Life, he said: "Disease cannot be genuine. This is why sufferers are constantly in revolt against it. If disease were a reality people would have to accept it without protest, for realities cannot be evaded or overcome."

Disease Not Genuine

"Science insists that disease is in belief, in appearance, or in ignorance, rather than in reality. It belongs in the same category with the belief in the flatness of the earth. For certainly the earth appears flat. Occasionally to this day may be found a person who believes it flat. Obviously the flatness is in his thought, in his ignorance. Some day the simple fact will dawn upon him that the earth is round. Then the flatness will be cured."

"Some day the undeniable fact will dawn upon the supposedly sick man that Life is God. Then his sickness will be healed, because disease and mortality cannot be ascribed to Deity. If God is Life, then Life must be diseaseless, ageless, endless."

Making the Right Choice

"Human experience," he continued, "consists to a considerable degree in making choices and decisions. Christian Science acquaints the individual with the spiritual facts which enable him to judge and choose wisely and rightly."

A person makes a right choice, he gives himself a Science treatment, when he embraces Life and renounces everything opposed to Life. When he recognizes that Life is irrepressible, unconquerable, incorruptible. Report of Dental Clinic in Deerfield

The Dental Clinic at the Deerfield Grammar school has reported on the inspection of the teeth of children in all grades. Dr. Edward F. Munro, dentist in charge of the program, has just inspected all children in first through 8th grade, and reports the average number of cavities and defective teeth per child has dropped from four and one-half last year to two and one-half this fall.

The marked decrease is due to the work done last year as a result of the inspection. Another marked

decrease should occur after the work suggested by this year's survey has been done. These inspections are made as a service of the school, and the work needed is reported to the parents for their action. It is suggested in each case that the work be done by the family dentist, however, the work will be done by the school dentist at regular prices if the family so desires.

Along with the work done in the clinic, a dental education program is being carried on in the school classrooms. Posters on dental health are displayed, and discussions on proper care of the teeth are held in the classrooms. Later in the year

it is planned that discussions on the topic will be held by Dr. Munro. General surveys throughout the nation have indicated that illness among school children is very often due to defective teeth, thus the program has as its end general physical well being. By using the school clinic survey, much preventive work is being done, and serious teeth conditions are avoided by getting at the work before serious defects have developed.

The program is offered as a public service to the community and the school or dental office is free at any time to discuss the details of the program.
