**Post Office Will Be Open Until 8 P.M. Evenings Before Xmas**

The Highland Park Post Office will remain open evenings this week and next, (as well as this Saturday afternoon and evening) until 8 p.m., for the convenience of patrons mailing Christmas parcels and letters.

Attention is again called to the importance of mailing Christmas parcels in time to reach destination not later than Saturday morning, December 24. This means that parcels for the Pacific Coast states should be mailed, to secure best handling, between Dec. 15-17; for Western and Southwestern states, Dec. 16-19; for Northeastern, Eastern and Southern states, Dec. 17-20; for neighboring states, Dec. 18-20; and to points in Illinois, Dec. 20-21.

Christmas cards and letters can be mailed several days after parcels, to arrive for Christmas. Mailed the last two days before Christmas, however, they should be sent Air

Mail and Special Delivery. It is preferable to mail Christmas greetings at the 3c rather than the 1½ rate, because the latter cannot contain a personal message or be sealed, and are not forwarded or returned in case of change in address.

Postmaster Cobb states that plenty of extra help has been selected and will be on hand to prevent any congestion at the post office during the rush and to insure speedy delivery of incoming Christmas mail and gift parcels. Two large army trucks will again be available, loaned by Fort Sheridan, to assist in local distribution of the hundreds of holiday parcel post packages. Even those arriving on Christmas Sunday and Monday, the 25th and 26th, will be delivered on those days. The last carrier delivery of Christmas letters will be Saturday afternoon, the 24th. Only Special Delivery letters will be delivered on the 25th and 26th. The post office will be closed all day Monday, the 26th.
