Washington, D. C., Jan. 7 .- There really is very little I can add to that which has already been said in the public press accounts of the opening of the 76th Congress and the President's Message on the State of the Union, delivered on the second day of the session. No doubt every citizen interested in the affairs of his government has read the message in its entirety, seeking to determine what course the Administration proposes to follow during 1939.
