

Winnetka Grade Project Is Begun



Work was started last week on the grade separation from South avenue, Glencoe, through Winnetka to the southern limits of the project a short distance north of Kenilworth avenue. The foregoing pictures are:

No. 1. Two new buildings under construction, just south of Oak street, Winnetka, and adjacent to the right of way of the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee Railroad company, one of which is to be used as headquarters by the resident P.W.A. engineering staff in charge of Inspector C. S. Gaines. The other by the Winnetka village project engineers P. E. Conner and C. I. Brooks.

No. 2. Progress picture of the temporary depot of the Chicago and North Western Railway, at Winnetka. Another similar building is being erected at Hubbard Woods.

Headquarters Buildings

No. 3. Headquarters buildings of Decker & McDowell, who are building the temporary tracks over which trains will be operated during work on the project.

No. 4. Building new automobile drive at temporary Elm street station. This drive also extends to Oak street.

No. 5. First excavation work on the "cut" in which the four tracks ultimately will be laid; was done last Friday, just north of Elm street. Excavation work is not to be launched in full swing, however, until after the temporary tracks are laid. Removal of this dirt was made in order to complete a fill for the temporary north-bound North Western track in the vicinity of Harbor street, Glencoe. The four track cut at Elm street will be approximately 20 feet deep when completed.
