

Seek to Remove Route 42 Markers from Sheridan Road

we believe, should be moved there as soon as possible."

Members of the property owners association and others who have been working for this improvement, point out that when Sheridan road was made into a main state highway there was no other available route for through traffic north and south between Chicago and Milwaukee, the number of cars then was relatively insignificant and no one foresaw the damage that a state highway of this kind would do to the residential character of the communities. Federal engineers recommended the removal of the Route 41 markers to the Skokie and the markers were removed there in line with the principles of modern city planning and development, those working for the removal of the Route 42 markers point out.

Technicalities in the law have been the chief obstacle to the removal of the markers to date, Mr. Martin said. The Association and other bodies on the North Shore have made studies of traffic count and other data pointing to the need of further reduction of through travel inside the towns. One of the most recent surveys has just been completed by the firm of Bennett and Frost, widely known architects and city planners. These authorities and others hold that direction of the bulk of through traffic both freight truck and private car, to the Skokie, which is a natural "alley" for the North Shore, is vital to the preservation of the residential character of the towns and cities affected.

LEONARDO DA VINCI

The life and romance of Leonardo da Vinci, one of the earliest of the great Italian artists of the Renaissance, has through recent writings become more familiar and understandable.

Leonardo da Vinci was a man of universal genius — a painter, a sculptor, an architect, a civil and military engineer, and astronomer and a student of the sciences. All these correlate to give definite character to his paintings. His influence as an educator was made lasting by founding an art academy in Milan. He was appointed chief engineer and architect to the Pope's army in 1502. The last years of his life were spent in the service of France, and he died at the Chateau de Cloux, near Amboise.

His two best known paintings, "Mona Lisa" and "The Last Supper" are the treasures of the Louvre in Paris, and the Church of Santa Maria della Grazie in Milan, respectively.

Modern writings on Leonardo da Vinci, include: two volumes of the "Notebooks of Leonardo da Vinci," arranged and rendered into English and introduced by Edward MacCurdy. The notebooks are proof that Leonardo was a scientist and a mechanic as well as an artist and educator, and interested in architecture and public works. Like many gifted thinkers he reflects the aspirations and urges of his day and his environment. Mr. MacCurdy has patiently gathered, translated and arranged these notes for the reader who will find plenty for study.

"From these volumes we gather a finer understanding of the intellect of Leonardo da Vinci and also the social circumstances that made him what he was.

"Leonardo da Vinci, the Tragic Pursuit of Perfection" — a biography by Antonina Vallentin and translated by E. W. Dickes, is our most recent life of da Vinci. The biography is a straight forward account of the life of this very remarkable man, such of it being told in terms of his work. The psychology and artistry belonging to each great painting is well told. The author does bring to us the fact that it was only on rare occasions that Leonardo actually achieved greatest, due perhaps to the fact that the period in which he lived was not ready or able to use his remarkable qualities. Mme. Vallentin expresses this in: "Thus was the grandest effort every made by man to explore and interpret the universe defeated by this man's mortality. His unique career, a lifetime devoted to research in every field of knowledge, ended without publication even of fragments of his conclusions. Mankind was to have to discover afresh what he knew already to explore afresh the paths he had trodden and mapped, to fall into his errors after he had recognized them, to struggle out of the paths he had evaded."

Other Writings about Da Vinci

There was an edition of the "Notebooks" arranged and rendered into English by Edward MacCurdy in '23. "Leonardo the Florentine," a study in personality by Rachel B. Taylor.

"Leonardo da Vinci," — the novel, by Merezhkovskii, is the "Romances of Leonardo" translated from Russian by Bernard G. Guernsey and illustrated with 100 reproductions of the work of Leonardo, selected and arranged by J. B. Neumann.

These books are available for your enjoyment at the Highland Park Public Library.
