

Rev. Henry Hedlund Resigns Pastorate at Highwood Church

The Rev. Henry G. Hedlund, pastor of the Zion Lutheran Church of Highwood, has tendered his resignation to this congregation. The resignation takes place the last Sunday of March. Pastor Hedlund has served this congregation almost 10 years and it is with the deepest regret upon the part of the congregation that it accepts his resignation. The congregation has grown in number as well as increased church attendance. Many constructive repairs and additions have been obtained under his pastorate. The latest acquisition was the purchase of a Hammond electric organ which will be installed by next Sunday.

When Pastor Henry Hedlund entered upon the ministry of the Zion congregation, it was a congregation under the support of the Illinois Conference Home Mission Board. But after four years this congregation became self-supporting. Pastor Hedlund has accepted the call tendered him by the Lutheran Church of Lockport, Illinois, and will begin his duties there the first of April. His many friends wish him the richest blessing and success in his newly chosen parish.

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P.T.A. to Hear Talk on Art Exhibition

A talk on "Art—A Specialized Talent for an Everyday Need" by Miss Elizabeth Robertson of Ravinia, who is the art supervisor of the Chicago public schools, and an exhibit of the art work of the students of the high school, which will be explained by Patricia Flynn, a junior, will constitute the program of the high school P.T.A. meeting on Thursday afternoon, February 2.

Some of the students' work that will be displayed was recently on exhibition at the high school conference at the University of Illinois and at Illinois Wesleyan college. The exhibit at the state university resulted in a very complimentary letter from the art director. At Illinois Wesleyan, where prizes were given, the local exhibit won first place.

The advanced work to be displayed at the P.T.A. meeting consists of soap carvings; decorated boxes, tooled leather purses, portfolios, and desk sets; clay modeling (fired and glazed in the high school; air brush designs and figures (a technique now commonly used in commercial work), and illustrations in pen and ink, water color, wash, charcoal, pencil, and colored chalk.

Large projects of the students that have attracted the attention of visitors to the high schools are the murals in the study halls and corridors. In the East building, where the P.T.A. meeting will be held, the parents will have an opportunity to see "Races of Mankind," from 310; "Evolution of Education," from 216; and "The Good Earth," first floor corridor.

Posters are made by the students for numerous school attractions and community events. For several years the students have participated in the American Legion contests.

The elementary work that will be on exhibition consists of problems in line movements, wash drawings, black and white and colored sketches of still life, problems in composition, problems in design (patterns for cretonnes, wallpaper, tiles, and pen and ink illustrations).

The classes, which are taught by Lucille Wood, include students from all four years of the high school.

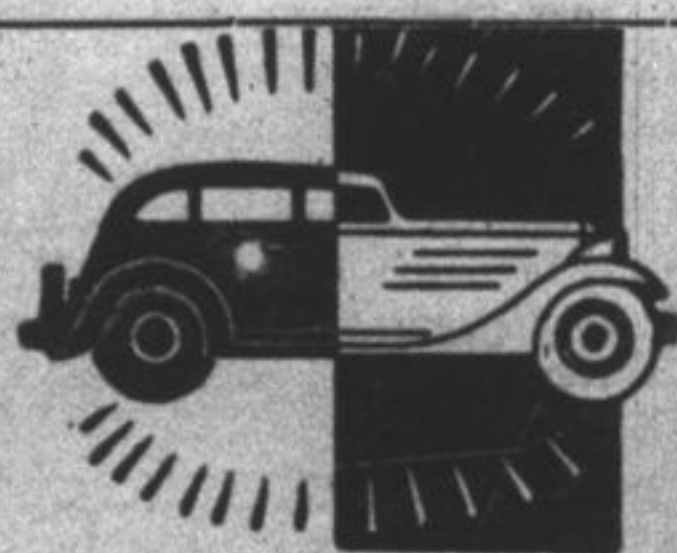
