### Boy Scout News

#### Scout Ambulance in Safety Exhibit at Troop Dinner

One of the many interesting exhibits to be seen at the Troop 324 annual dinner on February 2nd will be built around the safety factor which is so important in scout work. The troop staff has been fortunate in securing the cooperation of the Kenosha council, Boy Scouts of America, which has undertaken the public education safety program in a large scale.

#### Scout Ambulance

Parked in front of the Presbyterian church under floodlights will be exhibited the Kenosha boy scout leader's red cross First Aid Corps ambulance. It is one of the latest and most completely equipped vehicles of its type today. Equipped with complete water rescue equipment including grappling irons, water telescope, diving apparatus, trailer, eight foot dinghy, also seven complete first aid kits containing blankets, splints of every description, tents, cots, folding field table, and other miscellaneous articles such as four pairs of skis, eight foot toboggan, private car stretcher equipment, etc., it is prepared for any type or degree of emergency. The ambulance is a one and a half ton Dodge rescue truck capable of maintaining its own power and light should it operate in a rural or stricken area. It has a 1250 watt 110 volt Homelite plant on the truck which operates a 500 watt floodlight, two 250 watt floodlights, one vapor and waterproof light, siren and flashing light, a Mair's light, and in addition at the same time can furnish enough electrical current to relight a hospital or other building where the electrical lines have been broken at a crucial time. All Kenosha county hospitals are wired to receive this emergency service.

Other equipment carried by the truck includes 20 ton hydraulic jack, 6½ ton low lift jack, 1 body king jack, an E. and J. inhalator, electric lanterns, red flares, flashlights, oxygen tanks, oxyacetylene cutting outfit body ripper, complete rubber goods for handling hot wires, bolt cutters, many types of fire-extinguishers, crow bars, sledges, etc. The truck is also equipped with short wave radio, and radi facilities. The public of Highland Park is strongly encouraged to examine this exhibit in the interest of personal education.

#### Red Cross Corps

A uniformed unit of the scout leaders Red Cross Corps will demonstrate the exhibited equipment. Within the church will be a troop safety exhibit under the direction of George J. Hinn, A.S.M. who is director of health and safety for Troop 324. Mr. George Scheuchenflug, chairman of the Health and Safety committee for the North Shore Area council of boy scouts will also be present and will answer any question you may care to offer. Make it a point to visit Troop 324 on Thursday evening, February 2.
