

Correct Use of the Flag of THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

- Do not let Flag touch floor or ground at any time.
- Do not place any object or emblem above Flag.
- Do not use Flag as drapery. Use bunting.
- Do not use Flag as part of costume or uniform.
- Do not use Flag in any form of advertising.
- When Flag is displayed on a platform, place staff to right of speaker—
- When Flag is displayed on floor level, place staff to right of audience.
- When Flag is used on a motor car display Flag from staff, never drape or tie on—
- Salute Flag when it passes.
- Honor and Protect Flag under all circumstances.

With his priceless collection of 200 pieces, which can be examined at leisure by those who attend his fascinating talk, Dr. Walker will delight his audience by his interesting manner of describing his hunt for samplers throughout the world. This talk will be given in the club room, Thursday, February 9, at 10 o'clock in the morning, and is free to members of the club. Non-members, however, will be very welcome upon payment of a small guest fee. Such a charming subject treated in an attractive manner will appeal to a large group in the club, and an exceptionally big crowd will attend promptly at 10 o'clock.

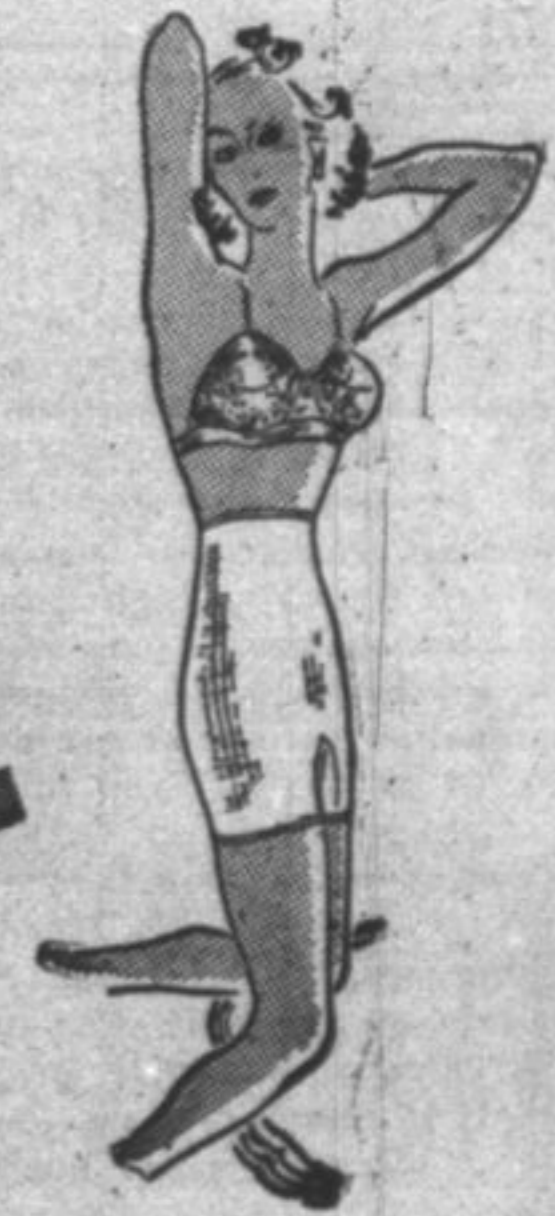
