A demand for a new ward in Highwood, which was recently made by the Highwood Civic Improvement association will be discussed at a meeting to be held tomorrow evening in the Highwood City Hall. Due to the fact that the city's population has reached 4,000, it is felt by this group that a fourth ward is necessary to comply with the Illinois statutes.

The annual city election in this city will be held April 18 and at that time, three or perhaps five aldermen will be chosen.

Terms of half of the six aldermen who were elected in April 1937 will end this spring by virtue of their drawing short straws. They are: Richard Shannon, first ward; Edward Williams, second, and Jesse Helton, third.

The other three, J. F. Farneti, first ward; George C. Kenry, second and Geoan Flocchi, third, have two years yet to serve as have the other elective officers.

All incoming aldermen will have four-year terms. The period for filing nomination petitions will extend from Feb. 17 to March 14.

Members of the city council whose terms expire undoubtedly will seek to succeed themselves. The Highwood Civic Improvement association is expected to enter a candidate in each ward.
