

AN OPEN LETTER FROM

MAJOR FRANK J. RONAN

TO E. C. WAMPLER, Chairman,

CITIZENS CAUCUS COMMITTEE:

It is with pleasure and a sense of gratitude I have mailed to you my copy of the questionnaire sent to all candidates seeking nomination at the Primaries, February 28. I feel certain that each and everyone will welcome, as I do, the opportunity to submit an application for public office to the citizenry of Highland Park which asks for the same type of information demanded when an applicant seeks private employment.

So far as I know, this is the first time in any municipal political campaign, where a group of citizens has devised a plan under which they, as voters, can secure intimate, accurate and proper information about the men whom they must nominate for public office.

In my own case, I have given you conscientious answers to each of the 15 questions your committee has asked; I have told you to the best of my ability why I am seeking the office of Mayor of Highland Park, and what I believe the important issues of this campaign are. One thing above all else I wish to emphasize: I have no selfish personal motives in seeking public office. The executive administration of Highland Park can no longer be looked upon as a side line and honorary office. To give Highland Park what our people are entitled to will involve time and personal sacrifice.

You are free to publicize my Questionnaire in any manner you deem proper. Upon its release, and with your permission, it is my intention to mail a copy of my answers in the Questionnaire to every voter of Highland Park.
