HOSTESS HOUSE

The empty store on the northeast corner of the main intersection of the Village of Deerfield is to be occupied and all expenses of the project for a six months period are to be by popular subscription. The sponsor is to be the Deerfield Chamber of Commerce, and the reason is to improve the appearance of the business district. For several years this store has been unoccupied, and because of the whiteness of the building and its prominent place, it has marred the appearance of the community. It is to be comfortably furnished and will be a Hostess house for Deerfield. Nothing will be sold there, but on its walls will be a directory telling where all types of goods may be purchased. It will be an information bureau, a bus station for the high school young people, a community service center, and summing it up altogether, a real friendly greeting to residents and visitors.

With this building occupied, first impressions of visitors will be kinder and there will be every indication that Deerfield is a friendly, progressive community.
