Thirteenth Annual Student Stunts At High School March 18

Twelve distinctly different acts, including a vocalist, a tap dancer, a juggler, a magician, a quartet, a pianist, a reader, a dramatic skit, a playlet, a jazz orchestra, a dance group, and a tumbling crew are in strenuous rehearsal at the Highland Park high school for the thirteenth annual presentation of "Student Stunts." The 1935 edition of this most popular dramatic effort of the student body will take place Saturday evening, March 18, in the high school auditorium.

In addition to the cast of over 80 high school students, a large stage and production crew will assist in perfecting and presenting this year's show. If tentative plans materialize, the program will be given in a novel manner far different from those of previous productions. In any event, the 1935 "Stunts" will make a distinct bid for recognition as a worthy successor to its popular predecessors. Over 1700 people attended the show last year and many were turned away at the box office at certain time.

Miss Elyse Rinkenberger, dramatic coach at the high school, will direct Student Stunts for the eighth successive year. The show is sponsored by the Parent-Teachers association, who introduced "Stunts" in 1927 and have presented it each spring of the past twelve seasons. The proceeds of the ticket sale will, as in former years, be placed in a scholarship fund for needy students.

Here is a suggested list of books for your reading on health:

Be Healthy—by Katherine Crisp. A book of general, up to date physiology and personal hygiene; containing useful and readable material.

Healthful Living—by H. S. Diehl. This book contains advice on the preservation of physical fitness and the prevention of disease. Facts are based on medical knowledge.

Your Carriage, Madam!—by Janet Lane. A guide to good posture. This author advises you how to walk, sit and work so that a natural posture will result.

Middle Age is What You Make It—by Boris Sokolov. Written in popular language a doctor explains some of the physical and emotional causes of the decline of health and vitality associated with middle age.

The Business Man and His Health—Jesse F. Williams. The book contains matter of fact advice on the health problem of modern life, vacations, hobbies and health; to include exercise and mental hygiene in business.

Diet and Personality—by Loretta Bogert. The subtitle of this book is fitting food to type and environment. Some of the chapter headings are: The slender person; the stocky person; the perils; over fatigue; diet for the middle aged and underweight.

The Balanced Diet—by Logan Jennings. A simple presentation of the fundamentals of correct diet with chapters on diet in disease and food fads.

Keep Your Youth—Andree Brunel. A book of daily exercises. (This book translated from French)

You Can Sleep Well—by Edmund Jacobson. The ABC's of restful sleep for the average person. A doctor gives directions in a series of six lessons for progressively relaxing the nerves and muscles of each part of the body as a prelude to sleep.

Slim and Supple—by Emmell Lefler. A new system of Swedish exercises for young and old. Well illustrated directions for maintaining bodily vigor and modern silhouette.

The Secret of Keeping Fit—by Arthur McGovern. An easy and sure way to better health.

Food and Health—by Henry C. Sherman. A fundamental book for the student or person who wishes information on vitamin content of foods and their value. Contains many experiments and charts based on laboratory analyses.
