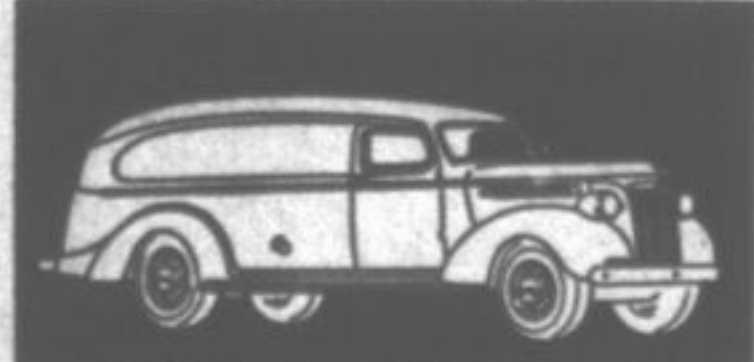
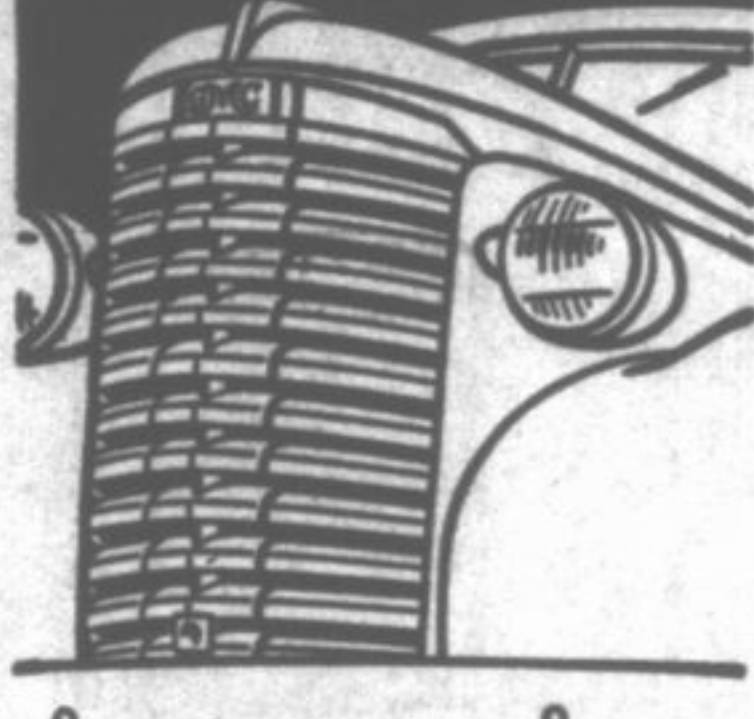




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Highwood Filing Date Closes Mar. 14 for City Election

March 14th is the final date for the filing of petitions in the Highwood city election, which takes place on Tuesday, April 18. One alderman will be elected in each ward, with the exception of the third ward, where two are to be chosen.

So far only five petitions have been filed. In the First ward, John M. Simpson, who for about 15 years served as city treasurer and city clerk in that city, has entered the race for alderman.

Albert Bjork, who has previously served in a similar capacity, has entered the political race for the second ward.

Four contestants, namely Paul Pagliai, Joseph Calsia, Richard Shannon and Evaristo Campagni will seek the two positions as aldermen in the third ward.

Alderman Richard Shannon of the first ward is the only administration man to have submitted his nominating petition thus far. Other retiring council members who will undoubtedly be aspirants again are Edward Williams, second ward, and Jesse Helton, third.

Addition of a fourth ward will add two more aldermen to the council.

The polling places will be as follows:

First Ward—Swedish M. E. church, Highwood avenue and Jeffrey's place.

Second Ward—Oak Terrace school on Prairie avenue.

Third Ward—City Hall garage on Waukegan avenue.

Fourth Ward—Scornavaccos barber shop, 546 Railway avenue.

Bob Olson Sails for South America

The S.S. Uruguay sailed at midnight last Friday on a glamorous voyage that will take it southward across the equator to the tropical climate of summer in South America. One of the passengers who stood at the ship's rail to watch the twinkling lights of Manhattan fade into the background was a local boy, Robert E. Olson, of South St. Johns avenue.

Bob, who is on his third major trip to foreign lands during the past twelve months, is sailing in the dual capacity of tour conductor and official photographer for his brother's company, Campus Tours, Inc. The tour of which he is leader will visit Barbados, Montevideo, Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, and Trinidad. He will take several thousand feet of natural color moving pictures for lecture purposes as well as a number of black and white and colored still pictures.

Last summer, as a European Tour Director, Bob traveled and photographed extensively in England, Holland, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Italy and France. His pictures have been used this fall and winter for lecture and sales promotional purposes, being shown throughout Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, and Michigan.

Mexico was Bob's colorful film laboratory late in the winter of 1938. While there he added Mexico City, Orizaba, Cuernavaca, Taxco, Puebla and Oaxaca to his already large library of pictures.

Upon his return from the Latin American countries, Bob will prepare to leave for Europe. He is to sail aboard the Cunard White Star Liner Carinthia from New York July 1st. He will again serve as a tour leader and photographer. This summer he will add Ireland, Scotland, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, and Jugo Slavia to his European edition.

In a radio-gram sent from the steamer Bob states the American Republic Line's Uruguay in which he is traveling, has a capacity passenger list including many notables. The Abbott Dancers are sailing in the Uruguay for a South American engagement.
