Funeral services were held Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock at St. James church, Highwood, of which the deceased was a member. Burial was in Memorial Park.

Besides her husband, James, she is survived by a son, Ryan and daughter, Magdalene both of Highland Park and another daughter, Mrs. Florence Saach of Highwood. There are also five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

A coroner's jury in a continued inquest here Friday, held that the gunshot death of William Puddy, 54, greenskeeper at the Mission Hills Country club, near Northbrook, was a suicide.

Puddy died of a bullet wound on Feb. 12 in the Highland Park hospital, several hours after he was found unconscious in the pump-house on the club grounds.

Conflicting testimony in the inquest the following day resulted in a postponement so that ballistics tests might be made on the revolver with which he was shot.
