Deerfield Park Board To Be Discussed At Open Forum Mar. 20

The five candidates for election to the proposed Park Board will each have an opportunity to express their views on activities the board will encourage and follow, at the open meeting of the Deerfield Civic association to be held in the Community room of the Deerfield Grammar school at 8 p.m. on March 20.

Each candidate will be allotted five minutes, after which citizens attending the meeting will have their chance to question the prospective board members.

To develop as many questions as possible in an attempt to bring forth all phases of the proposed Park District, each person attending

the meeting is asked to bring a prepared written question. These will be collected at the door, read during the meeting, and the candidates be requested to answer them.

Following the question period the active members of the association will decide by ballot whether the organization will go on record as favoring the Park District.

Inasmuch as the election is to follow five days after the above meeting, it will probably be the last opportunity citizens may have to openly discuss the proposal. All citizens of the area included in the proposed Park District will be welcome and are urged to attend.

Americanism To Be Stressed By State Legion Speakers

The interest of not only the members of the American Legion in the county, but that of church societies, civic and patriotic groups is being displayed in the coming State Commanders Caravan which is scheduled to reach North Chicago the evening of March 30th for a public meeting.

According to district commander, William Seymour, all of the Legion posts in the county are extending invitations to the members of local groups to attend this meeting, believing that the message the American Legion has on its policy toward the "isms" and other subversive activities is not alone the interest of the ex-service men, but the problem of all citizens.

"The meeting in North Chicago," stated George Biederman, commander of Sharvin Post of North Chicago, "is, one might say, a rallying point around which the citizens of Lake county can gather and give expression to their belief in the only 'ism' for which there is room in this country—Americanism. As Legionnaires we can be tolerant of many things, but there is a limit to which we can stand the efforts of minority groups to not only preach, but to work toward, the overthrow of our form of government. We will not tolerate this activity and will do everything in our power to expose these efforts."
