**YOUR FOOTHEALTH**

**BUNIONS AND THEIR CAUSES**  
Hallux Valgus or Bunion is an abnormal condition whereby the large toe is bent or pulled to the outside of the foot and is kept in that position by the contracted tendons or by a bony growth in the large joint.

Extreme pointed shoes cause the big toe to be forced to the outside thereby causing a dislocation in the great joint forming the bunion. Short hose or stockings play an important part in forming a bunion. If this continued pressure from shoes or hose persists in forcing the large toe out of line, then in time the tendons will contract and hold the large toe in a deformed position by themselves.

The large protruding head on the inner side of the foot will then rub and press against the side of the shoe causing pain on walking. This is usually followed by swelling and redness which in turn, due to constant irritation and pressure forms a corn and callous over the dislocated joint. This corn and callous together with the dislocated joint causes intense and continuing pain, at times just being a steady dull throbbing and at other times will have sharp shooting pains especially when the weather changes. If this condition persists, the ultimate result can and may be a deep seated infection in the bone structure.

Another complication following the formation of bunions is the forming of soft corns between large toe and the toe next to it. Due to the outward pressure of the big toe, there is pressure exerted on the sec-

ond toe which in turn is being irritated. This continual irritation and pressure between the two toes results in the formation of soft corns between the great toe and the second toe.

Remove the cause before the condition exists and you will be free from deformity and pain.

Another complication resulting from bunions is the Hammer Toe which will be discussed in the accompanying article.

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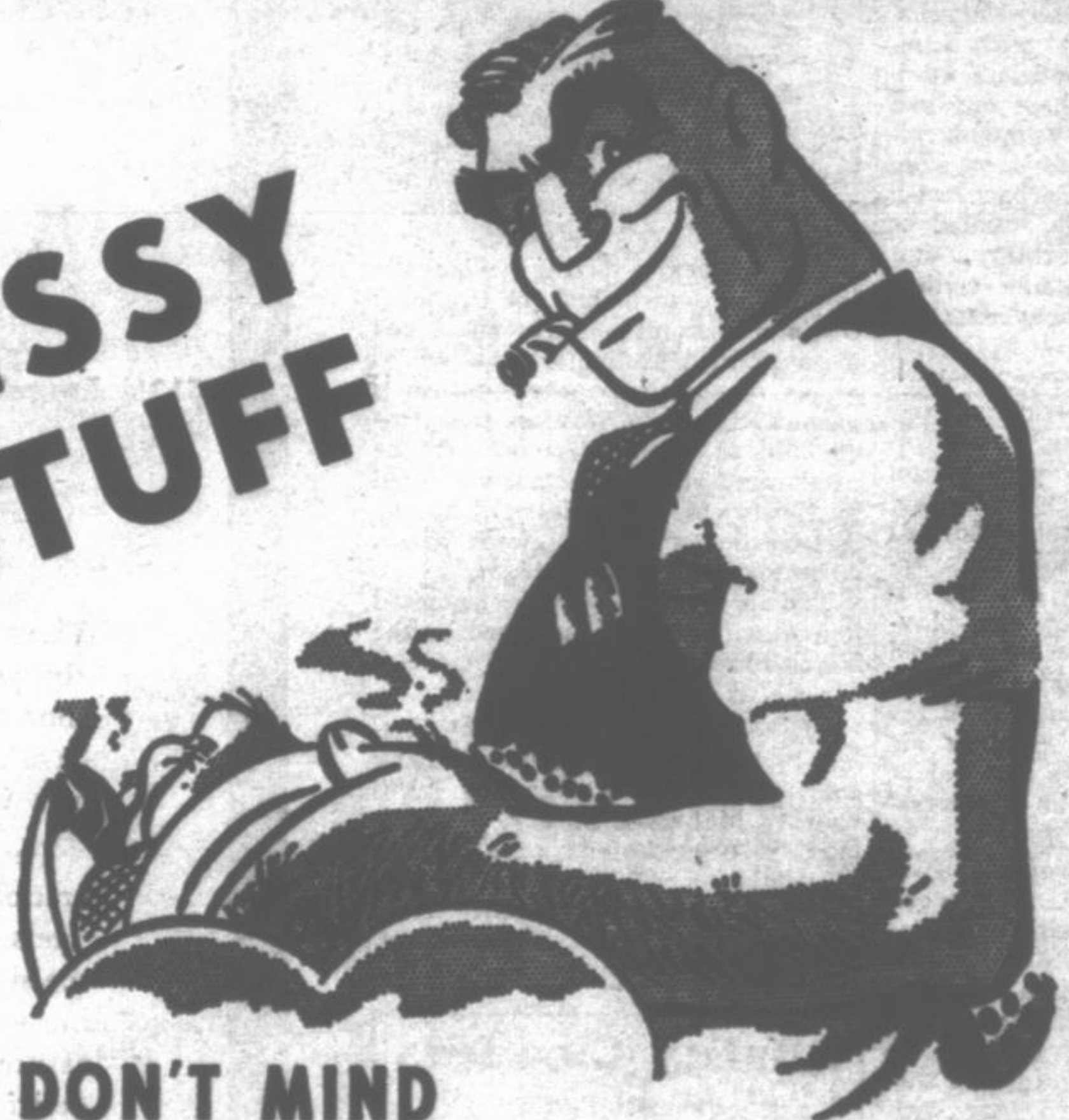
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
