FUNERAL RITES THURSDAY FOR BARBARA HUEHL

Death cut short the life of talented and lovely Barbara Christina Huehl, on Monday, March 6, following a week's illness due to an internal hemorrhage, at the Highland Park hospital. Barbara was born May 31, 1905, in Deerfield, the youngest daughter of Mrs. Louisa Herrmann Huehl and the late John C. Huehl. She was baptized and confirmed in St. Paul's Evangelical church. In addition to her graduation from the Deerfield Grammar school, and the Deerfield-Shields high school, she also completed a four year course in the Evangelical Leadership Training school. She studied voice with Selma Gogg Hummel and was presented in a concert at Lyon and Healy's. Her voice was often heard on radio station WBBM and she was a member of the Austin Choral club and sang in St. Stephen's church, Chicago. Miss Huehl had been employed for a number of years by the Portland Cement Co. in Chicago.

Funeral services were held on Thursday afternoon at the home on Springfield avenue where she lived with her invalid mother, and at St. Paul's church with Rev. B. C. Ott of St. Stephen's church, Chicago, and Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok officiating. The Rev. Mr. Ott's text was John 1:5 and Rev. Piepenbrok's was Songs of Solomon, 4th chapter, 16th verse: "Awake, Oh Northwind; and come thou South; blow upon my garden that the spices thereof may flow out." Miss Helen Potheroe of Chicago, daughter of the late composer Daniel Potheroe, was the soloist and sang "The Lord Is My Shepherd" and "In Faith I Quiet Wait."

Full honors were passed M. Gilmore of St. Louis, Walter Holloway of Evanston, George Koch and Carl Applquist of Chicago, John Burnhoff of Glenview and Christ M. Williams of Deerfield. Interment was in the Northfield Union cemetery.

Surviving are her mother; two sisters, Mrs. George Sampson (Arabella) of Chicago; and Mrs. Elmer Schmidt (Esther) of Elgin; one nephew, Robert Schmidt and two nieces, Betty Lou Sampson and Geraldine Schmidt, and a host of friends.

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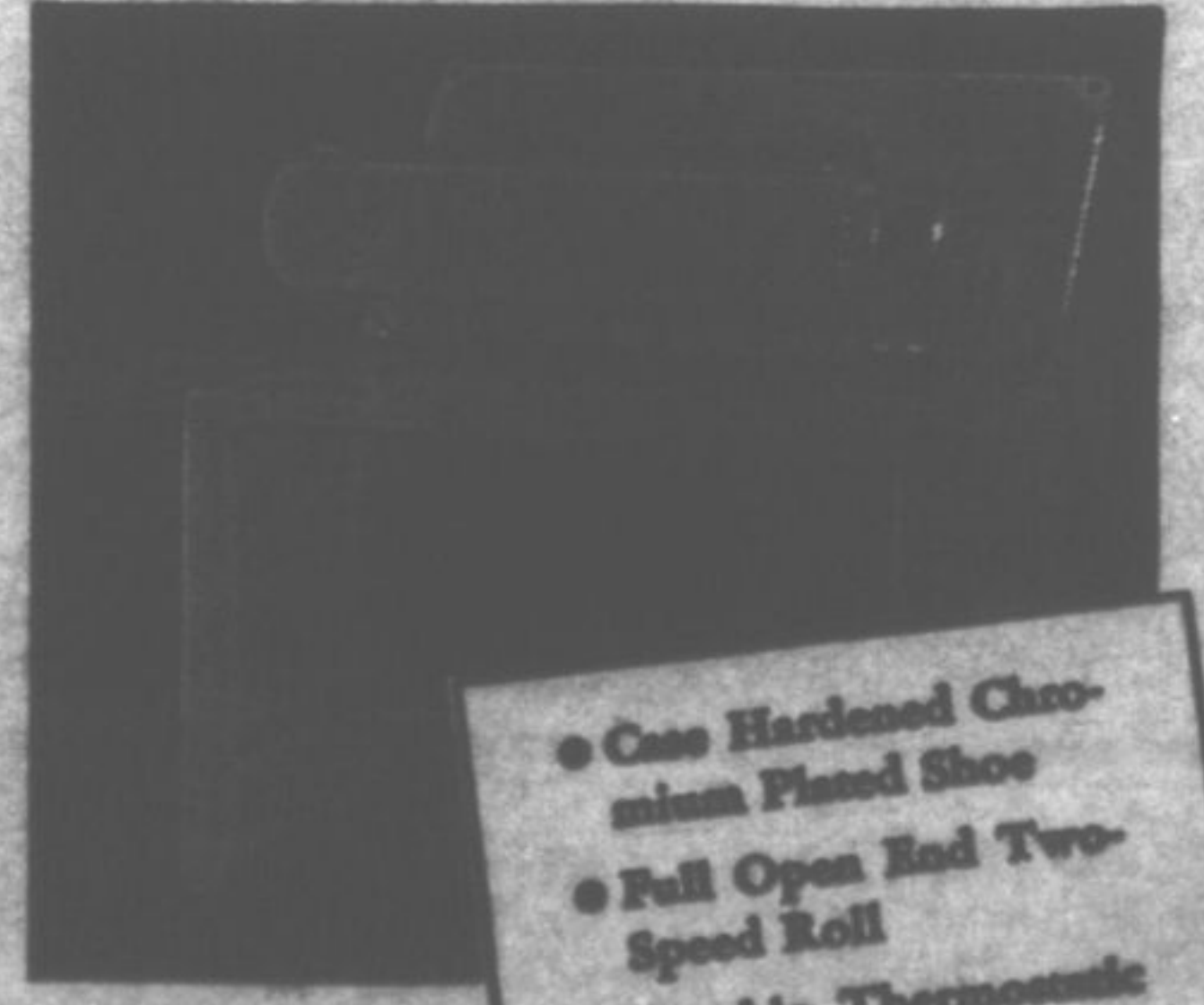
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
