School Districts To Elect Board Members April 8th

In District 105 (High school) the terms of two members of the board

Frank W. Read of Lake Forest, who has served as president of the Board, and Mrs. Laura D. Smith Highland Park are the retiring members. Both are running to succeed themselves. No other petitions have been filed.

For many years it has been the policy of the Board to have two members from Lake Forest, two from Highland Park and one from the western section of the district as a fair representation, and it is hoped that this same policy will be maintained this year.

The polling place will be: The auditorium foyer at Highland Park High school; in Deerfield at the Town Hall, and in Highwood at the Oak Terrace school.

Three candidates have filed petitions for election to the Board of Education, School District 107, Highland Park. These are Francis M. Knight, 411 Lake avenue, for President of the Board; Mr. Thomas H. Compere, 163 Clifton avenue, and Mrs. Edna O. Laegler, 620 Skokie avenue, for members of the Board.

Mr. Knight, a graduate of Yale university, a one-time teacher in the Hotchkiss School for Boys in Connecticut, is Vice-President the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago. He has been an active, civisminded resident of Highland Park for many years, being particularly interested in the Ravinia Summer Music concerts. Two of his children have graduated from the Elm Place school and two others are still in school there. Mr. Knight has been a member of the Board of Education for three years and is therefore well acquainted with its prob-

Mr. Howell W. Murray, who has so faithfully and efficiently served as President of the Board of Education of this district for the past ten years, is retiring from the Board. Mr. Murray's work in keeping the schools solvent, in carrying on through the depression years, in helping to secure constructive school legislation, has been outstanding. Review Mayoralty Candidates For

Mayor William Dooley, who is seeking reelection, and his oppo-

nent Major Frank J. Ronan are being reviewed this week, Mayor William M. Dooley was born in 1862 just seventy-six years ago in Chicago. He was the sixth son of Mr. and Mrs. William Dooley who had migrated from Ireland in the early part of the century. In 1866, when he was four years old, his family of five brothers and one sister moved to Highland Park

where Mayor Dooley has lived for the past seventy-two years. He received all of his education at the local schools in district 107, and a few years after his formal education, he became associated for and Co., as a salesman. For the following twenty-two years he followed the banking profession. During the World War he contributed his time and efforts to the cause of Liberty Loans, and after that period he became connected with the Alien Finger Printing Co. Recently the Federal Housing Administra-

In regard to his public service, Mayor Dooley served as Postmaster of this city for thirteen years, as Alderman for four years, as City Treasurer for four years, and as School Treasurer for twenty-six of government he held the office of Mayor from 1909 to 1911; and under the commission form of government from 1935 to the present. Aside from these municipal offices he is also the local representative of the American Red Cross.

Mayor Dooley feels that his experience in public office, his long and close association with the city of Highland Park, both socially and politically, and his working knowledge of this municipality's governmental problems, properly and adequately qualify him for re-election to the office of mayor.

Major Frank J. Ronan was born in Albany, New York just sixtynine years ago, and when still a baby, he and his family moved west to Chicago; it was there that he received his grammar school education. Shortly after that he went to Oakland, California and attended high school. At the age of fifteen he went to a as a cabin boy on a coastwise steamer running a course between Seattle and San Francisco at the time of the Chinese exclusion riots. In 1889 he became a boomer in the development of the Pacific cast region and pioneered through the great plains area between the Mississippi River and the Rocky Mountains, During much of this period he was in business on the westward moving American frontier. After several years of participation in the early commercial activities of the plains, Major Ronan travelled to the Northern regions of Wisconsin, Michigan, and (Continued on Page 7)

Baby Fatally Burned In Bedroom Blaze

Harold Glandt Jr., nine-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs Harold Glandt. 647 Grand View avenue, was fatally burned yesterday afternoon when fire, apparently started by crossed wires under an overstuffed chair next to the child's crib set the

Highland Park firemen, called to the scene, extinguished the fire, which had spread to another bed in
