They lived on a farm for 27 years, then moved into the village in 1913. The Seligs observed their Golden Wedding on March 31, 1936.

PARK BOARD ELECTION

The first in a series of exciting and interesting elections, will be the special election on Saturday afternoon, March 28, when voters will vote on the proposed park board district and five park commissioners. The polling places for this election will be the Bannockburn Grade School for residents of Bannockburn; the public library in the Deerfield Grammar School for all residents of Deerfield; and the office of the Clavey's Ravinia Nurseries for all residents living outside the two villages. The polls will be open from 1:00 p. m. to 6:00 p. m.

The five commissioners seeking election are J. P. Condon, George Jacobs, Lawrence V. Meyering, Milton O. Olson and Arthur Pearson.

GRADE SCHOOL ELECTIONS

There will be three candidates for election to the Deerfield Grammar School board of education on Saturday, April 5, from 1:00 p. m. to 5:00 p. m., in the school. A president and two members are to be elected and petitions have been filed by Burton B. McKay for president; and R. F. Grobe and George Harder for members, for reelection.

At the Bannockburn and Wilmot Grade schools one director will be elected to each board. Members of the Wilmot board are Roy Clavey, C. M. Willman and Ben Siljestrom. Mr. Siljestrom's term expires. Members of the Bannockburn school board are Harold Norman, Mrs. Eleanor Torbet and Edward R. Seese. Mr. Seese's term term expires.

VILLAGE ELECTION

There will be three tickets in the field for the Deerfield Village election on April 19. The first ticket to be filed was the Better Government Party and includes the following three for trustees: Homer G. Cazel, Jirah D. Cole, Jr., and Edward B. Crush, and for police magistrate: Dan Hunt. On the Citizens Ticket the three candidates for trustees are Oliver F. Burnett, Jr., Lawrence Fry and Harry Stuppel; and for police magistrate: Raymond Meyer. The third ticket is the Peoples Party and those seeking election for trustees are William Hertel, W. W. Stem, Sr., and Russell Potterton; and for police magistrate: Raymond Clavey. Stuppel and Hertel are seeking reelection, but the third trustee whose term expires is Ralph Peterson, who declines to run again.

Voters will also mark their ballots on the following proposition: "Shall there be levied for a period of four years 87 1/2 hundredths of one per centum for general corporate purposes, exclusive of the amount levied for payment of bonded indebtedness or interest thereon and exclusive of taxes authorized by acts which by their terms provide that such taxes shall be in addition to taxes for general corporate purposes."

TOWNSHIP ELECTION

Although nine candidates are seeking the village trustee jobs, that election does not seem to be causing as much excitement as the contest for township road commissioner. All candidates for that office are energetically campaigning and many are making a house to house canvass. The five seeking the road commissioner job are James E. The West Deerfield Township election will be held the first Tuesday in April. Two trustees for the township library, who are unopposed are Raymond A. Nelson and Floyd Stanger.

The polling place in precinct three (West Lake Forest) has been changed from the store to the Everett Grammar School. The other two precincts remain the same—east side at the Town Hall and west side at the Edna Fritsch residence. Precinct committees from West Lake Forest have both moved away.
