DO NOT BUILD FIRES ON WINDY DAYS

Fire Chief E. C. Hoskins of the Highland Park fire department is urging all citizens of Highland Park to use more precaution when doing their spring cleanup around their premises. Since last Wednesday a total of 33 runs have been recorded by the local department, the greater proportion of these resulting from grass or brush fires. A total of 17 calls were responded to, Sunday, (two weeks ago) alone, and the majority of these occurred between the hours of 10:51 a.m. and 2 p.m. With only three pieces of apparatus available to fight fires it is difficult to respond to so many calls promptly. At one time during Sunday activities, all available equipment was out fighting grass fires. During this interim, had a serious conflagration in a home or business house developed, it is likely that the fire would have proved disastrous before any equipment could have been obtained.

This is a very serious condition, and the only possible way that it can be combated, is for the citizens of Highland Park to cooperate with the Fire department and under no circumstances start a fire out of doors when the wind is blowing at 40 m.p.h.

Back fire around all buildings, and start fires against the wind to avoid endangering your property, as well as your neighbors is the advise of the local fire chief.

Prove yourself a good citizen and good neighbor by careful consideration of the property of other citizens in this community.
