I am a candidate for the office of Commissioner of the Park District of Highland Park. I have been urged to seek election by a number of my friends in various parts of Highland Park who believe as I do that there are a number of things that can be done to improve the administration of the affairs of our Parks, and that thereby the recreational facilities and possibilities of ALL the Parks can be developed to the fullest extent without any increase in tax burden. I further believe that our parks should promote and foster outdoor exercise and recreation in EVERY season of the year. Children (including my own) have complained that skating facilities are made available in other North Shore towns several weeks ahead of Highland Park. I do not believe that any one section of our city should be favored with park facilities at the expense of other deserving areas. Having at one time resided in the South end of Highland Park I fully appreciate the necessity of affording immediate consideration to the needs of this and other rapidly growing areas of our city. The necessity for administration improvement becomes more apparent when one takes even a casual glance at the condition of equipment in one of our largest parks. High-powered lights have been allowed to burn in this park on many occasions for many hours after all sports activities had ceased, and it has been suggested, very properly, I think, that the saving effected by correcting this condition be applied towards the cost of gravel for foot paths, or some other equally useful application. While an administration might justify inertia on a basis of SAVING the taxpayers money it does not necessarily follow that this attitude always achieves the desired result as everyone knows that property must be kept in good repair if it is to have any value at all, and I would much rather have it said that full value had been secured from EVERY dollar expended. Such value might also be measured in terms of happiness and well being for the entire community.

I am seeking election APRIL 4th, to an office which is without salary. I am motivated, not by furtherment of any personal or business interest but solely by the desire to contribute in any way possible towards the general well being of our community, and may I suggest that your contribution include your going to the polls on April 4th, voting as you see fit, but voting.
