## HIGH SCHOOL ELECTION

The Deerfield - Shields Township high school election will be held on Saturday, April 8, from 12 noon, to 7:00 p.m. in Highland Park, Lake Forest and Deerfield. The polling place in Deerfield is the Town hall on Deerfield road. There is no opposition and the candidates are George Reed of Lake Forest and Mrs. H. B. Smith of Highland Park. On the same afternoon, in the same building, there will also be another election, which will be for township school trustee. Walter Cope of Highland Park is a candidate for re-election. Election for grade school members will be held in the respective schools and should not be confused with the high school election.

## CHARLES ORSBORN STARS IN BASKETBALL

"From a New York article comes the following excerpt:

The prediction that the team that beats Bradley Tech's crack five, known as the 'Scourge of the Midwest' will be the champions, came true last Monday evening in Madison Square Garden before a crowd of over 18,000, third largest number to pack the stadium in its history, with 5,000 turned away.

The large sign on Madison Square Garden had in lights L.I.U. vs. Bradley Tech, and the Long Island Blackbirds were hard pressed to eke out the two-basket victory. Had it not been for a questionable reverse decision against Bradley, which was hotly disputed by President Morris of the association sponsoring the tournament, the outcome would have been decidedly different.

It required Long Island's entire squad of eleven men to wear down the Tech players, who used only one substitute during the game. 18,000 fans shouted 'go Bradley go' as they watched the Famous Five stage their brilliant comeback in which they outplayed the much-touted Long Islanders 21 to 13.

Chuck Orsborn, wiry Tech forward and pivot man, led his team in scoring and was one of the smoothest and speediest ball handlers on the floor.

On Wednesday evening Long Island won by a comfortable margin from undefeated Loyola of Chicago, and Bradley easily defeated the vaunted St. John's team from whom Loyola barely won the first night.


