Your Foot Health

Hammer Toes

Hammer Toe is a deformity in the extent that it can affect the four smaller toes of the foot. The toe most affected is the second toe or that toe next to the great toe. The smaller toes of the foot are made up of three bones each of which is called a Phalanx. In the formation of a hammer toe, the phalanx bone next to the foot is turned upward and the other two phalanges of the toe have a downward turn thus forming a regular curve. Sometimes the end of the toe is extended upward also forming another curve.

Hammer toe is caused by wearing short or very narrow pointed shoes. They are also caused by short stockings and hose. Sometimes is an inherited condition, but as a general rule it is caused by incorrect and improper footwear.

Due to the top of the toe being forced upward, there naturally would be constant pressure and irritation against that toe in contact with the shoe. This would result in developing a corn and callous on the that toe. There will also be swelling and quite a bit of pain. The end of the toe will also develop a corn and callous and since the end of the toe is being forced downward due to the tightening of ligaments and tendons, it will flatten and force the nail to grow downward into the sides of the toe instead of growing outward. This will either result in an ingrown nail or a club nail. The subject of nails and their deformities will be discussed in the following article.

In treatment of hammer toe, the best thing to remember is to prevent its occurrence. The hammer toe can be corrected by either mechanical or surgical means according to the type of condition existing.

To Take Legal Action to Collect Back Taxes in West Deerfield

The amount of the 1938 assessed valuation of real estate in West Deerfield Township and the 1938 tax rates have been released by the county authorities. These figures indicate a further reduction in assessed valuation and in taxes. The reduction is largely due to a decline in railroad valuation.

The delinquent real estate taxes and penalties amount to about \$270,000 in West Deerfield Township. There are over 3,000 parcels of real estate in the township on which taxes are unpaid for periods of from one to ten years. Nearly one fourth

of each year's taxes have not been collected.

Because of these conditions the county authorities are being forced to take legal action to collect the large amount of back taxes.

The 1938 tax bills will soon be distributed and each taxpayer is urged to pay his bill promptly. Also the back taxes should be paid in order to stop the running of penalties.

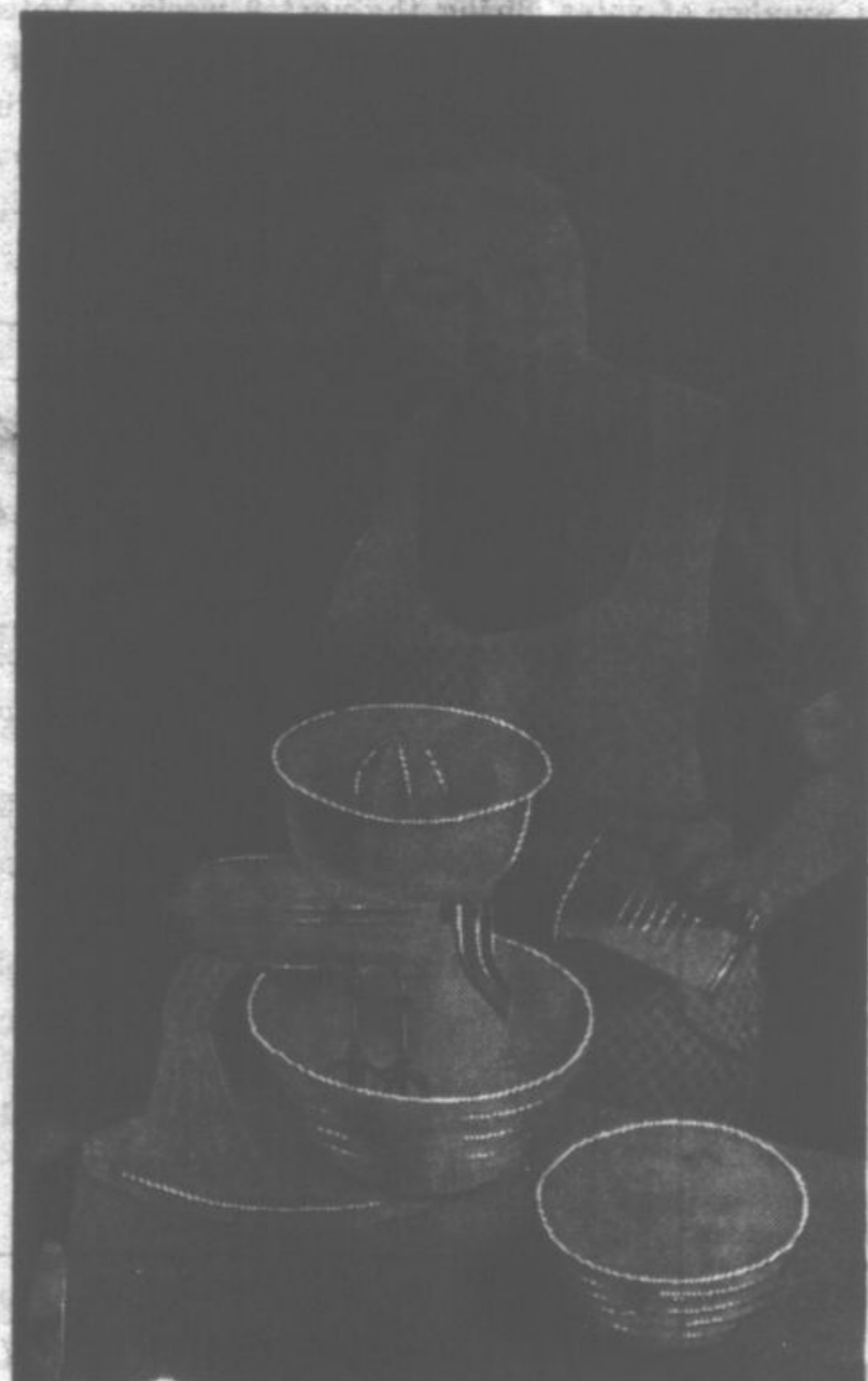
